#### **REVIEW & RESULTS OF OPERATIONS**

Cassius Mining Limited is an African focused industrial mineral developer (Madagascar - Limestone) and explorer (Tanzania – Lithium).

The principal activities of the consolidated group during the financial period were mine development, mineral exploration and seeking mining opportunities.

The net loss for the half-year ended 31 December 2023, after providing for income tax amounted to \$1,002,767(31 December 2022: loss of \$214,599).

### **EXPLORATION**

# SOALARA LIMESTONE PROJECT, MADAGASCAR

The Company announced an inaugural JORC 2012 Mineral Resource on 5 September 2023 after completing the 2<sup>nd</sup> of its exploration drilling phases. The MRE, based on a selective mining process, was defined as:

340m Tonnes of "High" purity Limestone (97% Calcium Carbonate, CaCO₃) at 95.7% cut off with:

- 100m Tonnes in the Indicated category, and
- 240m Tonnes in the Inferred category, or

130m Tonnes of "Very High" purity Limestone (98.6% Calcium Carbonate, CaCO<sub>3</sub>) at 97.5% cut off:

- 40m Tonnes in the Indicated category, and
- 90m Tonnes in the Inferred category

The Company is currently initiating an updated valuation and marketing study of the Project through specialist 3<sup>rd</sup> party service providers to best inform future operations.

# **CHENENE LITHIUM PROJECT, TANZANIA**

Lithium in the form of both Lepidolite and Spodumene has been identified in a 950m long pegmatite at up to 1.08% Li<sub>2</sub>O in the Dulu area of its PL 11920 license in surface geochemical sampling, along with elevated Cesium and Tantalum (to 2,782 ppm and 181 ppm respectively).

An adjacent parallel pegmatite just ~160m away (in a very small  $3^{rd}$  party license of just 0.14 km², fully enclosed within the Company's 300 km² large scale licenses) assayed several samples above 2% Li<sub>2</sub>O (up to 5.49% Li<sub>2</sub>O) from an exposed depth of ~2-3m only.

The Company is currently reviewing its forward plans on the Chenene Project and is presently in discussion with 3<sup>rd</sup> parties who have expressed interest in the Project.

#### **GHANA ARBITRATION**

**On 3 February 2023** the company commenced international arbitration against the Government of the Republic of Ghana ("Ghana") seeking damages in excess of USD 275 million as a consequence of Ghana's breach of the Large Scale Prospecting License Agreement entered into with the Company.

**On 9 October 2023** the 3-person tribunal ("Tribunal") was formally constituted, after which a timetable was agreed for the Tribunal to determine certain preliminary issues concerning its jurisdiction and seat of the arbitration.

On 4 December 2023 the Tribunal held a virtual hearing on the preliminary issues after the parties filed written submissions.

#### **EVENTS SUBSEQUENT TO REPORTING DATE**

There are no known events subsequent to balance date that would have a material effect on these financial statements after balance date other than:

#### Corporate:

- On 5 February 2024 the company issued 39,393,939 shares at \$0.033 raising \$1,300,000 (before expenses).
- On 7 March 2024 the company has entered into a Share Sale Agreement to sell to sell 100% of the issued capital of
  Cassius Mining (T) Limited (Subsidiary) which holds 4 licence permits located in Tanzania for up to \$1,150,000 and a
  1% net smelter royalty.

# Ghana International Arbitration:

- On 28 February 2024 the Tribunal issued its decision on the preliminary issues as follows: (i) the Tribunal has
  jurisdiction to hear the Company's contractual claims, despite Ghana's objection; (ii) the Tribunal is properly
  constituted under the Alternative Dispute Resolution Act, 2010 (Ghana); and (iii) the UNCITRAL Rules do not apply.
  The Tribunal also decided by majority, with one arbitrator disagreeing, that the seat of the arbitration is Accra,
  Ghana.
- The Tribunal did not rule on Ghana's objection to its jurisdiction to hear the Company's statutory claim, and has invited further submissions on this issue in the next phase of the arbitration.
- The Tribunal rejected Ghana's request for a stay of the arbitration, and directed that the arbitration shall proceed.

#### NOTES TO AND FORMING PART OF THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS

#### 1. Basis of Preparation

The half-year consolidated financial statements of Cassius Mining Ltd are a general purpose financial report prepared in accordance with the requirements of the *Corporations Act 2001*, Australian Accounting Standard AASB 134: Interim Financial Reporting and other Australian Accounting Standards which ensure compliance with International Financial Reporting Standards.

This interim financial report is intended to provide users with an update on the latest annual financial statements of Cassius Mining Limited and its controlled entities (the group).

It is recommended that this financial report be read in conjunction with the annual financial report of the group for the year ended 30 June 2023 and any public announcements made during the half-year in accordance with continuous disclosure requirements arising under the *Corporations Act 2001*.

The accounting policies have been consistently applied by the entities in the consolidated group and are consistent with those in the June 2023 financial report.

The half-year report does not include full disclosures of the type normally included in an annual financial report.

### **Reporting Basis and Conventions**

The half-year report has been prepared on an accruals basis and is based on historical costs modified by the revaluation of selected non-current assets, financial assets and financial liabilities for which the fair value basis of accounting has been applied.

#### **New and Amending Accounting Standards and Interpretations**

The accounting policies adopted in the preparation of the half year report are consistent with those followed in the preparation of the consolidated entity's annual financial statements for the year ended 30 June 2023, except for the mandatory adoption of new standards and interpretations. The adoption of these standards and interpretations did not have any material impact on the financial position or the performance of the Group.

#### **Going Concern**

The accounts have been prepared on the going concern basis, which contemplates continuity of normal business activities and the realisation of assets and liabilities in the normal course of business.

The Directors are aware that the Group's ability to continue as a going concern, and its ability to pay its debts as and when they fall due, is largely dependent on successfully managing its short to medium term liquidity position.
