


REVIEW OF OPERATIONS

Koonenberry Project

The Koonenberry Project is an emerging, district-scale copper, gold, nickel and base metals exploration package located 80km east of Broken Hill, New South Wales, Figure 1. The project comprises 3,300km² of contiguous tenure hosted entirely within rocks of the Delamerian Orogen, a sequence of Proterozoic to Devonian aged sediments, volcanics and intrusives which have undergone multiple mineralising, deformation, remobilisation and enrichment events. The Company considers the Koonenberry Belt to be highly prospective for several mineralisation styles due to the unique depositional environment and tectonic history of the Delamerian Orogen.



and mafic-ultramafic hosted Ni-Cu-Co-PGE deposits in the older Cambrian to Proterozoic rock sequences, as well as the formation of epithermal Cu-Ag-Pb deposits in the extensional tectonics along the Koonenberry Fault in the Silurian-Devonian period. At least four different deformation events over the history of the belt have been responsible for not only the remobilisation of existing mineralisation but also the introduction of Cu & Au mineralising fluids along deep-seated structures, such as the Koonenberry Fault which bounds the eastern margin of the Koonenberry Project. The key tectonic and depositional events within the Koonenberry Project are summarised in Figure 2.






Figure 3 – G11 Priority Corridors within the Koonenberry Project

Wilandra Copper Corridor

The Wilandra Copper Corridor is adjacent to the Koonenberry Fault and forms a 75km long belt with outcropping Cu-Zn mineralisation prospective for both syngenetic VMS and epigenetic Cu-rich base metal mineralisation. The Cambrian Ponto Group sediments and volcanics dominate the corridor, with only a very small section of this stratigraphy tested to date for Cu-rich, VMS derived base metal mineralisation.

The Company focussed much of the exploration efforts during the year on the Wilandra Copper Corridor, including surface geochemical sampling, the completion and interpretation of multiple geophysical surveys as well as an initial RC drilling program.

The geochemical sampling program was designed to fill in data gaps and test new conceptual targets along strike and parallel to known mineralisation. Several areas of elevated copper and related pathfinders were identified and require follow up sampling and geological mapping. Re-processing and interpretation work has been completed on existing MLEM (2022), HeliTEM (2021) and VTEM (2010) datasets during the year to identify anomalies that could be associated with the accumulation of massive sulphide mineralisation. The results from both the surface geochemical sampling and re-processed EM surveys are being used in conjunction with existing geological and geophysical data sets to identify and prioritise targets within the Wilandra Copper Corridor. This process is aimed at identifying and prioritising truly coincident geochemical and geophysical anomalies prior to drill-testing.




Figure 4 – Block Diagram showing the Structural Geology Interpretation of the Wilandra Corridor

Dr John Stewart of Geokincern completed a lithostructural interpretation of the Wilandra Copper Corridor. The interpretation was based on existing high resolution aeromagnetic-radiometric data and local geology, supplemented by detailed structural mapping. The results of the interpretation have allowed the stratigraphic sequence and copper mineralisation to be placed into a structural and tectonic framework. The refined model focuses on the interpreted location of local flexures on links between structures where dilation enhances the chances of thicker, higher-grade mineralisation (*Figure 4*). Subsequent drill-testing and geophysical surveys have tested and been used to refine the lithostructural model.




Figure 5 – Location of Wilandra Central relative to the Wilandra Corridor

The key focus area during the previous 12 months has been Wilandra Central, a 4.0km long zone of semi-continuous outcropping mineralised gossans and siliceous rocks (Figure 5). Exploration work completed at Wilandra Central included semi-targeted surface geochemistry sampling, detailed, lithostructural interpretation, a 12 line-kilometre, grid based Controlled Source Audio-frequency Magnetotellurics (CSAMT) geophysical survey, a 19-hole, 4,092 metre Reverse Circulation (RC) drill program with associated Down-hole Electromagnetic (DHEM) geophysical surveys and the commencement of a follow-up RC and Diamond (DD) drilling and DHEM survey program.

The CSAMT survey initially established a baseline geophysical signature over drill-defined copper mineralisation at Wilandra central, which was then used to identify several comparable geophysical features both along strike, and parallel to the known mineralisation across the surveys 10km extent.

The 19-hole (4,092m) RC drill program was designed to test several CSAMT targets in addition to several lithostructural targets within and along strike of the main mineralised part of Wilandra Central. The results of the CSAMT targets were disappointing with no sulphide mineralisation intersected. The majority of the CSAMT signatures related to either unmineralised fault zones or contacts between lithological units.




Figure 6 – Long Section looking northeast of the Peveril and Central Gossan prospects with recent G11 drillholes




Figure 7 - Exploration targets in Wilandra Central

The RC drill program did however, successfully extended a high-grade plunging shoot beneath outcropping copper mineralisation at the Peveril prospect (*Figure 6*) and confirmed the existence of a copper mineralised linking structure (Central Gossan) between Peveril and Grasmere along strike (*Figure 7*). Drilling highlights include:

- 6m at 3.46% Cu and 1.45% Zn from 311m in GR24RC014 (in a broader zone of 9m at 2.68% Cu and 1.06% Zn from 310m).
- 5m at 2.48% Cu and 1.08% Zn from 327m in GR24RC017.
- 1m at 3.55% Cu and 0.68% Zn from 265m in GR24RC015 (in a broader zone of 4m at 1.33% Cu and 0.30% Zn from 264m).
- 3m at 1.83% Cu and 1.60% Zn from 363m in GR24RC019 (in a broader zone of 6m at 1.06% Cu and 1.03% Zn from 361m).
- 3m at 1.04% Cu and 1.16% Zn from 89m in GR24RC0003.

RC drillholes GR24RC014, GR24RC017 and GR24RC019 all intersected zones of massive sulphide mineralisation, reffectively confirming the continuity of the Peveril high-grade shoot 145m down plunge from previous high-grade copper intercepts to a depth of 330m below surface. The intercept in GR24RC015 likely represents the outer limit of the shoot.

The drilling also extended the known copper mineralised envelope at the Central Gossan prospect, southeast and along strike of Peveril. GR24RC003 intersected narrow, high-grade copper below outcropping copper mineralisation. The current geological model considers Central Gossan to be a mineralised structure linking the Peveril and Grasmere prospects. The depth potential of Central Gossan is untested with drilling and DHEM programs planned to advance the prospect.

Down hole electromagnetic (DHEM) surveys have been completed on nine of the 19 RC drillholes, which confirmed that high-grade copper sulphide mineralisation provides a clearly defined EM signature. These DHEM results when combined with re-modelled Moving Loop Electromagnetic (MLEM) data effectively defines conductance plates that plunge steeply to greater than 400m depth.

Following on from the success of the initial RC drill program, follow-up drill testing commenced toward the end of the reporting year, with 300m of RC and 286.1m of HQ diamond drill core completed. This follow-up program comprises up to 4,000m of a combination of RC and DD drilling with two main aims, the first being to test for further plunge continuity of the high-grade copper mineralisation defined at Peveril, down to a depth of 500m below surface. The methodology for the second phase of the program is based on the high conductance response returned from the DHEM survey in GR24RC019. This has provided confidence that the copper-rich, high-grade shoots should be detectable by DHEM surveys completed on wide spaced, deep drillholes. A program of wide-spaced drillholes with DHEM surveys has been planned to identify additional EM conductors related to high-grade copper mineralisation along the 4km mineralised strike length at Wilandra Central.

The recent drilling and DHEM results have reinforced the interpretation that the mineralisation intersected at Wilandra Central is structurally remobilised and potentially enriched from a VMS source.

Cymbric Corridor





Figure 8 - Location of Black Hills and Cymbric Vale Cu Prospects in relation to Wilandra Central

Historic data compilation work completed during the reporting year for the Cymbric Corridor has identified two priority targets for follow-up work. The priority targets are Black Hills and Cymbric Vale Cu which are located approximately 25km to the west of Wilandra Central (Figure 8).

Black Hills is defined by a broad 1km by 3km zone of elevated Cu and Au in soil sampling located at the intersection of three faults, evident in the government supplied, open-source aeromagnetic data (*Figure 9*). Geological survey mapping and interpretation at 1:250,000 scale has identified these structures as faulted contacts between the Cambrian Ponto Group and the older Neo-Proterozoic Kara Formation and may have acted as major fluid conduits. G11 considers that the intersection between the NE-SW oriented fault and the two NW-SE to N-S oriented faults to be of primary interest, especially given the broad zone of elevated Cu and Au associated with this intersection. This area of interest remains untested by drilling.




Figure 10 – Oblique long section of the drill defined mineralisation at Cymbric Vale Cu

The Cymbric Vale Cu prospect hosts a drill defined, structurally controlled Cu-rich mineralised structure that outcrops in the destern part of the prospect. Drilling in 2021 by Odin Metals defined the mineralisation over 300m of strike length and 100m of dip extent, intersecting broad zones of Cu around a higher-grade core (*Figure 10*). The mineralisation is interpreted to be structurally controlled and is considered open in all directions. The drill defined structure is located on the western edge of the prospect with coincident soil and geophysical anomalies that cover an area 3km across strike and 5km along strike that remains untested.

Wertago Corridor

Multi-element geochemistry from soil, rock chip and RC drill samples within the Wertago Corridor demonstrate metal zonation analogous to intermediate to high sulphidation epithermal mineralisation. This is consistent with the extensional

tectonic setting for the formation of the Mt Daubney Basin, which hosts Wertago. The outcropping epithermal Cu-Ag mineralisation is controlled by a complex array of structures formed during the Siluro-Devonian extensional tectonics forming the Mt Daubney Basin. The complex fault architecture generally conforms to a Riedel fault system, with the mineralised structures aligning along the NE-oriented R-shears. The potential for shoots to form in dilatant zones at both structural intersection points and jogs within the shears within the 30km long Mt Daubney Basin is considered high.

No exploration work has been carried out at Wertago during the reporting period.

Bilpa Corridor

Artisanal production of copper, lead, and zinc at Bilpa demonstrate the Koonenberry Belt's potential to host significant economic mineralisation across its entire strike length. No exploration work has been carried out at Bilpa during the reporting period.

Principal activities

The principal activity of the Consolidated Entity during the financial year was mineral exploration.

Dividends

There were no dividends paid, recommended or declared during the current or previous financial year.

Review of operations

The loss for the consolidated entity after providing for income tax amounted to \$1,055,797 (30 June 2023: \$1,377,595).

Financial performance

During the full year period, the Consolidated Entity recorded a loss amounting to \$1,055,797 (30 June 2023 \$1,377,595).

(Significant changes in the state of affairs

On 11 September 2023, the Company announced the appointment of Mr Martin Donohue as a Non-Executive Chairman.

On 24 November 2023, the Company changed its name from Odin Metals Limited to G11 Resources Limited through the approval of shareholders at the Company's Annual General Meeting.

On 5 June 2024, the Company announced the appointment of Mr Richard Buerger as Managing Director and Chief Executive Officer. Mr Simon Peters will remain on the board as a Non-executive Director.

There were no other significant changes in the state of affairs of the consolidated entity during the financial year.

Matters subsequent to the end of the financial year

On 17 July 2024, the Company announced it had received firm commitments to raise \$4.25 million (before costs) through the issue of 217,500,000 new fully paid ordinary shares at an issue price of A\$0.02 per share.

As part of the Placement, Directors of G11 have committed to subscribe for \$700,000, of which approval was granted by shareholders through the extraordinary general meeting held on 10 September 2024.

On 23 July 2024, the Company issued 182,500,000 shares at 2 cents per share (\$0.02) as part of the placement announced on 17 July 2024.

No other matter or circumstance has arisen since 30 June 2024 that has significantly affected, or may significantly affect the consolidated entity's operations, the results of those operations, or the consolidated entity's state of affairs in future financial years.

Likely developments and expected results of operations

During the previous financial years, the Consolidated Entity has entered into agreements to acquire new projects and project rights and the success of the Consolidated Entity will depend on exploration activities proposed to be carried out on the current projects areas of interest which have been acquired or granted to the Consolidated Entity.

The Consolidated Entity continues to review potential new opportunities, if the Directors are successful in acquiring new projects or entering into a joint venture, it is expected that part of the funding held by the Consolidated Entity may be directed to the purchase of that project and to the exploration and development plan for that project. It may be that additional cash will be required to fund any of these events should they eventuate. In that case the Directors will be required to review the funding options available to the Consolidated Entity.

Business risk management

The Consolidated Entity is committed to the effective management of risk to reduce uncertainty in the Consolidated Entity's business outcomes and to protect and enhance shareholder value. There are various risks that could have a material impact on the achievement of the Consolidated Entity's strategic objectives and future prospects.

Key risks and mitigation activities associated with the Consolidated Entity's objectives are set out below:

Exploration risk

The Consolidated Entity's projects are at various stages of exploration, and potential investors should understand that mineral exploration is a high-risk undertaking. There can be no assurance that exploration of these projects, or any other tenements that may be acquired in the future, will result in the discovery of an economic mineral deposit.

The future exploration activities of the Consolidated Entity may be affected by a range of factors including geological conditions, limitations on activities due to seasonal weather patterns, unanticipated operational and technical difficulties, industrial and environmental accidents, local title processes, changing government regulations and many other factors beyond the control of the Consolidated Entity.

addition, the tenements forming the projects of the Consolidated Entity may include various restrictions excluding, limiting or imposing conditions upon the ability of the Consolidated Entity to conduct exploration activities. While the Company will formulate its exploration plans to accommodate and work within such access restrictions, there is no guarantee that the consolidated Entity will be able to satisfy such conditions on commercially viable terms, or at all.

The Consolidated Entity uses a number of exploration techniques in order to reduce the level of exploration risks and continues explore new and innovative technologies through its day to day operations.

Regulatory risk

The Consolidated Entity's mining and exploration activities are dependent upon the maintenance (including renewal) of the tenements in which the Consolidated Entity has or acquires an interest. Maintenance of the Consolidated Entity's tenements is dependent on, among other things, the Consolidated Entity's ability to meet the licence conditions imposed by relevant authorities. Although the Consolidated Entity has no reason to think that the tenements in which it currently has an interest will not be renewed, there is no assurance that such renewals will be given as a matter of course and there is no assurance that new conditions will not be imposed by the relevant authority or whether the Consolidated Entity will be able to meet the conditions of renewal on commercially reasonable terms, if at all.

The Consolidated Entity works with local government and mining departments to ensure it meets the required level of reporting requirements and to reduce any potential for breach of regulatory requirements.

Future funding risk

The Consolidated Entity has no operating revenue and is unlikely to generate any operating revenue in the foreseeable future. Exploration and development costs and pursuit of its business plan will use funds from the Consolidated Entity's current cash reserves and the amount raised under the Equity Offer.

The development of one or more of its projects may require the Consolidated Entity to raise capital in excess of the funds proposed to be raised under the Equity Offer.

Any additional equity financing may be dilutive to Shareholders, may be undertaken at lower prices than the then market price (or Offer Price) or may involve restrictive covenants which limit the Consolidated Entity's operations and business strategy. Debt financing, if available, may involve restrictions on financing and operating activities.

Although the Directors believe that additional capital can be obtained, no assurances can be made that appropriate capital or funding, if and when needed, will be available on terms favourable to the Consolidated Entity or at all. If the Consolidated Entity is unable to obtain additional financing as needed, it may be required to reduce the scope of its activities and this could have a material adverse effect on the Consolidated Entity's activities and could affect the Consolidated Entity's ability to continue as a going concern. The Consolidated Entity's funding requirements are reviewed on a regular basis in order to mitigate future funding risk.

Environmental regulation

The consolidated entity holds participating interests in a number of exploration tenements. The various authorities granting such tenements require the tenement holder to comply with the terms of the grant of the tenement and all directions given to under those terms of the tenement. To the best of the Directors' knowledge, the Group has adequate systems in place to ensure compliance with the requirements of all environmental legislation described above and are not aware of any breach of those requirements during the financial year and up to the date of the Directors' report.

- focusing on sustained growth in shareholder wealth, consisting of dividends and growth in share price, and delivering constant or increasing return on assets as well as focusing the executive on key non-financial drivers of value
- attracting and retaining high calibre executives

Additionally, the reward framework should seek to enhance executives' interests by:

- rewarding capability and experience
- reflecting competitive reward for contribution to growth in shareholder wealth
- providing a clear structure for earning rewards

In accordance with best practice corporate governance, the structure of non-executive director and executive director remuneration is separate.

Non-executive directors remuneration

Fees and payments to non-executive directors reflect the demands and responsibilities of their role. Non-executive directors' fees and payments are reviewed annually by the Board. The Board may, from time to time, receive advice from independent remuneration consultants to ensure non-executive directors' fees and payments are appropriate and in line with the market. The chairman is not present at any discussions relating to the determination of his own remuneration.

The long-term incentives ('LTI') include share-based payments. During the 2024 financial year, options were issued to directors which formed part of their remuneration.

The Company did not use any external remuneration consultants during the financial year.

Note 1. General information

The financial statements cover G11 Resources Limited as a consolidated entity consisting of G11 Resources Limited ('the Company' or 'Parent enity') and the entities it controlled (together referred to as the Consolidated Entity) at the end of, or during, the year. The financial statements are presented in Australian dollars, which is G11 Resources Limited's functional and presentation currency.

G11 Resources Limited is a listed public company limited by shares, incorporated and domiciled in Australia. Its registered office and principal place of business is:

A description of the nature of the consolidated entity's operations and its principal activities are included in the directors' report, which is not part of the financial statements.

The financial statements were authorised for issue, in accordance with a resolution of directors, on 25 September 2024. The directors have the power to amend and reissue the financial statements.

Note 2. Material accounting policy information

The accounting policies that are material to the consolidated entity are set out below. The accounting policies adopted are consistent with those of the previous financial year, unless otherwise stated.

New or amended Accounting Standards and Interpretations adopted

The consolidated entity has adopted all of the new or amended Accounting Standards and Interpretations issued by the Australian Accounting Standards Board ('AASB') that are mandatory for the current reporting period.

Any new or amended Accounting Standards or Interpretations that are not yet mandatory have not been early adopted.

Going concern

The financial report has been prepared on the going concern basis, which assumes continuity of normal business activities and the realisation of assets and the settlement of liabilities in the ordinary course of business.

For the year ended 30 June 2024, the Consolidated Entity incurred a net loss of \$1,055,797 (2023:\$1,377,595), net cash outflows from operating activities of \$620,209 (2023: \$683,418) and negative cashflows from investing activities of \$1,590,336 (2023: \$1,406,792) and had a cash balance as at 30 June 2024 of \$1,090,392 (2023: \$3,300,937).

The directors determined that the use of the going concern basis of accounting is appropriate in preparing the financial report.

The assessment of the going concern assumption is based on the Consolidated Entity's cash flow projections and application of a number of judgements and estimates, resulting in the conclusion of a range of reasonably possible scenarios. Included in the Directors going concern cash flow assessment is that sufficient funds can be secured if required by a combination of capital raisings and the deferment of forecast payments for exploration and evaluation activities.

Accordingly, the financial report has been prepared on the basis that the Consolidated Entity can continue normal business activities and meet its commitments as and when they fall due, and the realisation of assets and liabilities in the ordinary course of business.

Basis of preparation

These general purpose financial statements have been prepared in accordance with Australian Accounting Standards and Interpretations issued by the Australian Accounting Standards Board ('AASB') and the Corporations Act 2001, as appropriate for for-profit oriented entities. These financial statements also comply with International Financial Reporting Standards as issued by the International Accounting Standards Board ('IASB').

Historical cost convention

The financial statements have been prepared under the historical cost convention, except for, where applicable, the revaluation of financial assets and liabilities at fair value through profit or loss, financial assets at fair value through other comprehensive income, investment properties, certain classes of property, plant and equipment and derivative financial instruments.

Note 2. Material accounting policy information (continued)

Critical accounting estimates

The preparation of the financial statements requires the use of certain critical accounting estimates. It also requires management to exercise its judgement in the process of applying the consolidated entity's accounting policies. The areas involving a higher degree of judgement or complexity, or areas where assumptions and estimates are significant to the financial statements, are disclosed in note 3.

Parent entity information

In accordance with the Corporations Act 2001, these financial statements present the results of the consolidated entity only. Supplementary information about the parent entity is disclosed in note 21.

Principles of consolidation

The consolidated financial statements incorporate the assets and liabilities of all subsidiaries of G11 Resources Limited ('company' or 'parent entity') as at 30 June 2024 and the results of all subsidiaries for the year then ended. G11 Resources Limited and its subsidiaries together are referred to in these financial statements as the 'consolidated entity'.

Subsidiaries are all those entities over which the consolidated entity has control. The consolidated entity controls an entity when the consolidated entity is exposed to, or has rights to, variable returns from its involvement with the entity and has the ability to affect those returns through its power to direct the activities of the entity. Subsidiaries are fully consolidated from the date on which control is transferred to the consolidated entity. They are de-consolidated from the date that control ceases.

Intercompany transactions, balances and unrealised gains on transactions between entities in the consolidated entity are eliminated. Unrealised losses are also eliminated unless the transaction provides evidence of the impairment of the asset transferred. Accounting policies of subsidiaries have been changed where necessary to ensure consistency with the policies adopted by the consolidated entity.

The acquisition of subsidiaries is accounted for using the acquisition method of accounting. A change in ownership interest, without the loss of control, is accounted for as an equity transaction, where the difference between the consideration transferred and the book value of the share of the non-controlling interest acquired is recognised directly in equity attributable to the parent.

Where the consolidated entity loses control over a subsidiary, it derecognises the assets including goodwill, liabilities and noncontrolling interest in the subsidiary together with any cumulative translation differences recognised in equity. The consolidated entity recognises the fair value of the consideration received and the fair value of any investment retained together with any gain or loss in profit or loss.

Operating segments

perating segments are presented using the 'management approach', where the information presented is on the same basis as the internal reports provided to the Chief Operating Decision Makers ('CODM'). The CODM is responsible for the allocation of resources to operating segments and assessing their performance.

Revenue recognition

The consolidated entity recognises revenue as follows:

Interest

Interest revenue is recognised as interest accrues using the effective interest method.

Accounting policy for Government grants

Government grants are recognised where there is reasonable assurance that the grant will be received and all attached conditions will be complied with. When the grant relates to an expense item, it is recognised as income on a systematic basis over the periods that the related costs, for which it is intended to compensate, are expensed. When the grant relates to an asset, it is recognised as income in equal amounts over the expected useful life of the related asset.

Other revenue

Other revenue is recognised when it is received or when the right to receive payment is established.

Current and non-current classification

Assets and liabilities are presented in the statement of financial position based on current and non-current classification.

Note 2. Material accounting policy information (continued)

An asset is classified as current when: it is either expected to be realised or intended to be sold or consumed in the consolidated entity's normal operating cycle; it is held primarily for the purpose of trading; it is expected to be realised within 12 months after the reporting period; or the asset is cash or cash equivalent unless restricted from being exchanged or used to settle a liability for at least 12 months after the reporting period. All other assets are classified as non-current.

A liability is classified as current when: it is either expected to be settled in the consolidated entity's normal operating cycle; it is held primarily for the purpose of trading; it is due to be settled within 12 months after the reporting period; or there is no unconditional right to defer the settlement of the liability for at least 12 months after the reporting period. All other liabilities are classified as non-current.

Deferred tax assets and liabilities are always classified as non-current.

Cash and cash equivalents

Cash and cash equivalents includes cash on hand, deposits held at call with financial institutions, other short-term, highly liquid investments with original maturities of three months or less that are readily convertible to known amounts of cash and which are subject to an insignificant risk of changes in value.

Trade and other receivables

Other receivables are recognised at amortised cost, less any allowance for expected credit losses.

Investments and other financial assets

investments and other financial assets are initially measured at fair value. Transaction costs are included as part of the initial measurement, except for financial assets at fair value through profit or loss. Such assets are subsequently measured at either amortised cost or fair value depending on their classification. Classification is determined based on both the business model within which such assets are held and the contractual cash flow characteristics of the financial asset unless an accounting mismatch is being avoided.

Financial assets are derecognised when the rights to receive cash flows have expired or have been transferred and the consolidated entity has transferred substantially all the risks and rewards of ownership. When there is no reasonable expectation of recovering part or all of a financial asset, its carrying value is written off.

Financial assets at amortised cost

A financial asset is measured at amortised cost only if both of the following conditions are met: (i) it is held within a business model whose objective is to hold assets in order to collect contractual cash flows; and (ii) the contractual terms of the financial asset represent contractual cash flows that are solely payments of principal and interest.

Financial assets at fair value through other comprehensive income

inancial assets at fair value through other comprehensive income include equity investments which the consolidated entity intends to hold for the foreseeable future and has irrevocably elected to classify them as such upon initial recognition.

Property, plant and equipment

Plant and equipment is stated at historical cost less accumulated depreciation and impairment. Historical cost includes expenditure that is directly attributable to the acquisition of the items.

Depreciation is calculated on a straight-line basis to write off the net cost of each item of property, plant and equipment (excluding land) over their expected useful lives as follows:

Buildings 40 years
Leasehold improvements 3-10 years
Plant and equipment 3-7 years

The residual values, useful lives and depreciation methods are reviewed, and adjusted if appropriate, at each reporting date.

Leasehold improvements are depreciated over the unexpired period of the lease or the estimated useful life of the assets, whichever is shorter.

An item of property, plant and equipment is derecognised upon disposal or when there is no future economic benefit to the consolidated entity. Gains and losses between the carrying amount and the disposal proceeds are taken to profit or loss.

Note 2. Material accounting policy information (continued)

Exploration and evaluation assets

Exploration and evaluation expenditure in relation to separate areas of interest for which rights of tenure are current is carried forward as an asset in the statement of financial position where it is expected that the expenditure will be recovered through the successful development and exploitation of an area of interest, or by its sale; or exploration activities are continuing in an area and activities have not reached a stage which permits a reasonable estimate of the existence or otherwise of economically recoverable reserves. Where a project or an area of interest has been abandoned, the expenditure incurred thereon is written off in the year in which the decision is made.

Exploration and evaluation assets are assessed for impairment when facts and circumstances suggest that the carrying amount of an exploration and evaluation asset may exceed its recoverable amount. The recoverable amount of the exploration and evaluation asset (for the cash generating unit(s) to which it has been allocated being no larger than the relevant area of interest) is estimated to determine the extent of the impairment loss (if any). Where an impairment loss subsequently reverses, the carrying amount of the asset is increased to the revised estimate of its recoverable amount, but only to the extent that the increased carrying amount does not exceed the carrying amount that would have been determined had no impairment loss been recognised for the asset in previous years.

Where a decision has been made to proceed with development in respect of a particular area of interest, the relevant exploration and evaluation asset is tested for impairment and the balance is then reclassified to development. Where an area of interest is abandoned, any expenditure carried forward in respect of that area is written off.

Impairment of non-financial assets

Non-financial assets are reviewed for impairment whenever events or changes in circumstances indicate that the carrying amount may not be recoverable. An impairment loss is recognised for the amount by which the asset's carrying amount exceeds its recoverable amount.

Recoverable amount is the higher of an asset's fair value less costs of disposal and value-in-use. The value-in-use is the present value of the estimated future cash flows relating to the asset using a pre-tax discount rate specific to the asset or cash-generating unit to which the asset belongs. Assets that do not have independent cash flows are grouped together to form a cash-generating unit.

Trade and other payables

These amounts represent liabilities for goods and services provided to the consolidated entity prior to the end of the financial year and which are unpaid. Due to their short-term nature they are measured at amortised cost and are not discounted. The amounts are unsecured and are usually paid within 30 days of recognition.

Employee benefits

Share-based payments

Equity-settled and cash-settled share-based compensation benefits are provided to employees.

Equity-settled transactions are awards of shares, or options over shares, that are provided to employees in exchange for the rendering of services. Cash-settled transactions are awards of cash for the exchange of services, where the amount of cash is determined by reference to the share price.

The cost of equity-settled transactions are measured at fair value on grant date. Fair value is independently determined using either the Binomial or Black-Scholes option pricing model that takes into account the exercise price, the term of the option, the impact of dilution, the share price at grant date and expected price volatility of the underlying share, the expected dividend yield and the risk free interest rate for the term of the option, together with non-vesting conditions that do not determine whether the consolidated entity receives the services that entitle the employees to receive payment. No account is taken of any other vesting conditions.

The cost of equity-settled transactions are recognised as an expense with a corresponding increase in equity over the vesting period. The cumulative charge to profit or loss is calculated based on the grant date fair value of the award, the best estimate of the number of awards that are likely to vest and the expired portion of the vesting period. The amount recognised in profit or loss for the period is the cumulative amount calculated at each reporting date less amounts already recognised in previous periods.

The cost of cash-settled transactions is initially, and at each reporting date until vested, determined by applying either the Binomial or Black-Scholes option pricing model, taking into consideration the terms and conditions on which the award was granted. The cumulative charge to profit or loss until settlement of the liability is calculated as follows:

- during the vesting period, the liability at each reporting date is the fair value of the award at that date multiplied by the expired portion of the vesting period.
- from the end of the vesting period until settlement of the award, the liability is the full fair value of the liability at the reporting date.

All changes in the liability are recognised in profit or loss. The ultimate cost of cash-settled transactions is the cash paid to settle the liability.

Market conditions are taken into consideration in determining fair value. Therefore any awards subject to market conditions are considered to vest irrespective of whether or not that market condition has been met, provided all other conditions are satisfied.

If equity-settled awards are modified, as a minimum an expense is recognised as if the modification has not been made. An additional expense is recognised, over the remaining vesting period, for any modification that increases the total fair value of the share-based compensation benefit as at the date of modification.

If the non-vesting condition is within the control of the consolidated entity or employee, the failure to satisfy the condition is the cated as a cancellation. If the condition is not within the control of the consolidated entity or employee and is not satisfied during the vesting period, any remaining expense for the award is recognised over the remaining vesting period, unless the award is forfeited.

If equity-settled awards are cancelled, it is treated as if it has vested on the date of cancellation, and any remaining expense recognised immediately. If a new replacement award is substituted for the cancelled award, the cancelled and new award is treated as if they were a modification.

Fair value measurement

When an asset or liability, financial or non-financial, is measured at fair value for recognition or disclosure purposes, the fair value is based on the price that would be received to sell an asset or paid to transfer a liability in an orderly transaction between market participants at the measurement date; and assumes that the transaction will take place either: in the principal market; or in the absence of a principal market, in the most advantageous market.

Fair value is measured using the assumptions that market participants would use when pricing the asset or liability, assuming they act in their economic best interests. For non-financial assets, the fair value measurement is based on its highest and best use. Valuation techniques that are appropriate in the circumstances and for which sufficient data are available to measure fair value, are used, maximising the use of relevant observable inputs and minimising the use of unobservable inputs.

Issued capital

Ordinary shares are classified as equity.

Incremental costs directly attributable to the issue of new shares or options are shown in equity as a deduction, net of tax, from the proceeds.

Business combinations

The acquisition method of accounting is used to account for business combinations regardless of whether equity instruments or other assets are acquired.

The consideration transferred is the sum of the acquisition-date fair values of the assets transferred, equity instruments issued or liabilities incurred by the acquirer to former owners of the acquiree and the amount of any non-controlling interest in the acquiree. For each business combination, the non-controlling interest in the acquiree is measured at either fair value or at the proportionate share of the acquiree's identifiable net assets. All acquisition costs are expensed as incurred to profit or loss.

On the acquisition of a business, the consolidated entity assesses the financial assets acquired and liabilities assumed for appropriate classification and designation in accordance with the contractual terms, economic conditions, the consolidated entity's operating or accounting policies and other pertinent conditions in existence at the acquisition-date.

Note 2. Material accounting policy information (continued)

Where the business combination is achieved in stages, the consolidated entity remeasures its previously held equity interest in the acquiree at the acquisition-date fair value and the difference between the fair value and the previous carrying amount is recognised in profit or loss.

Contingent consideration to be transferred by the acquirer is recognised at the acquisition-date fair value. Subsequent changes in the fair value of the contingent consideration classified as an asset or liability is recognised in profit or loss. Contingent consideration classified as equity is not remeasured and its subsequent settlement is accounted for within equity.

The difference between the acquisition-date fair value of assets acquired, liabilities assumed and any non-controlling interest in the acquiree and the fair value of the consideration transferred and the fair value of any pre-existing investment in the acquiree is recognised as goodwill. If the consideration transferred and the pre-existing fair value is less than the fair value of the identifiable net assets acquired, being a bargain purchase to the acquirer, the difference is recognised as a gain directly in profit or loss by the acquirer on the acquisition-date, but only after a reassessment of the identification and measurement of the net assets acquired, the non-controlling interest in the acquiree, if any, the consideration transferred and the acquirer's previously held equity interest in the acquirer.

Business combinations are initially accounted for on a provisional basis. The acquirer retrospectively adjusts the provisional amounts recognised and also recognises additional assets or liabilities during the measurement period, based on new information obtained about the facts and circumstances that existed at the acquisition-date. The measurement period ends on either the earlier of (i) 12 months from the date of the acquisition or (ii) when the acquirer receives all the information possible to determine fair value.

Earnings per share

Basic earnings per share

Basic earnings per share is calculated by dividing the profit attributable to the owners of G11 Resources Limited, excluding any costs of servicing equity other than ordinary shares, by the weighted average number of ordinary shares outstanding during the financial year, adjusted for bonus elements in ordinary shares issued during the financial year.

Diluted earnings per share

Diluted earnings per share adjusts the figures used in the determination of basic earnings per share to take into account the after income tax effect of interest and other financing costs associated with dilutive potential ordinary shares and the weighted average number of shares assumed to have been issued for no consideration in relation to dilutive potential ordinary shares.

Goods and Services Tax ('GST') and other similar taxes

Revenues, expenses and assets are recognised net of the amount of associated GST, unless the GST incurred is not recoverable from the tax authority. In this case it is recognised as part of the cost of the acquisition of the asset or as part of the expense.

Receivables and payables are stated inclusive of the amount of GST receivable or payable. The net amount of GST recoverable from, or payable to, the tax authority is included in other receivables or other payables in the statement of financial position.

Cash flows are presented on a gross basis. The GST components of cash flows arising from investing or financing activities which are recoverable from, or payable to the tax authority, are presented as operating cash flows.

Commitments and contingencies are disclosed net of the amount of GST recoverable from, or payable to, the tax authority.

New Accounting Standards and Interpretations not yet mandatory or early adopted

Australian Accounting Standards and Interpretations that have recently been issued or amended but are not yet mandatory, have not been early adopted by the consolidated entity for the annual reporting period ended 30 June 2024. The consolidated entity has not yet assessed the impact of these new or amended Accounting Standards and Interpretations.

Note 3. Critical accounting judgements, estimates and assumptions

The preparation of the financial statements requires management to make judgements, estimates and assumptions that affect the reported amounts in the financial statements. Management continually evaluates its judgements and estimates in relation to assets, liabilities, contingent liabilities, revenue and expenses. Management bases its judgements, estimates and assumptions on historical experience and on other various factors, including expectations of future events, management believes to be reasonable under the circumstances. The resulting accounting judgements and estimates will seldom equal the related actual results. The judgements, estimates and assumptions that have a significant risk of causing a material adjustment to the carrying amounts of assets and liabilities (refer to the respective notes) within the next financial year are discussed below.

Deferred Exploration and evaluation Expenditure

Deferred exploration and evaluation expenditure has been capitalised on the basis that the Consolidated Entity will commence commercial production in the future, from which time the costs will be amortised in proportion to the depletion of the mineral resources. Key judgements are applied in considering costs to be capitalised which includes determining expenditures directly related to these activities and allocating overheads between those that are expensed and capitalised.

In addition, costs are only capitalised that are expected to be recovered either through successful development or sale of the relevant mining interest. Factors that could impact the future commercial production at the mine include the level of reserves and resources, future technology changes, which could impact the cost of mining, future legal changes and changes in commodity prices. To the extent that capitalised costs are determined not to be recoverable in the future, they will be written off in the year in which this determination is made.

Share-based payment transactions

The consolidated entity measures the cost of equity-settled transactions with employees by reference to the fair value of the equity instruments at the date at which they are granted. The fair value is determined by using either the Binomial or Black-Scholes model taking into account the terms and conditions upon which the instruments were granted. The accounting estimates and assumptions relating to equity-settled share-based payments would have no impact on the carrying amounts of assets and liabilities within the next annual reporting period but may impact profit or loss and equity.

Impairment of non-financial assets other than goodwill and other indefinite life intangible assets

The consolidated entity assesses impairment of non-financial assets other than goodwill and other indefinite life intangible cassets at each reporting date by evaluating conditions specific to the consolidated entity and to the particular asset that may lead to impairment. If an impairment trigger exists, the recoverable amount of the asset is determined. This involves fair value less costs of disposal or value-in-use calculations, which incorporate a number of key estimates and assumptions.

It is reasonably possible that the underlying metal price assumption may change which may then impact the estimated life of mine determinant and may then require a material adjustment to the carrying value of mining plant and equipment, mining infrastructure and mining development assets. Furthermore, the expected future cash flows used to determine the value-in-use of these assets are inherently uncertain and could materially change over time. They are significantly affected by a number of factors including reserves and production estimates, together with economic factors such as metal spot prices, discount rates, estimates of costs to produce reserves and future capital expenditure.

Income tax

The consolidated entity is subject to income taxes in the jurisdictions in which it operates. Significant judgement is required in determining the provision for income tax. There are many transactions and calculations undertaken during the ordinary course of business for which the ultimate tax determination is uncertain. The consolidated entity recognises liabilities for anticipated tax audit issues based on the consolidated entity's current understanding of the tax law. Where the final tax outcome of these matters is different from the carrying amounts, such differences will impact the current and deferred tax provisions in the period in which such determination is made.

Recovery of deferred tax assets

Deferred tax assets are recognised for deductible temporary differences only if the consolidated entity considers it is probable that future taxable amounts will be available to utilise those temporary differences and losses.

Employee benefits provision

As discussed in note 2, the liability for employee benefits expected to be settled more than 12 months from the reporting date are recognised and measured at the present value of the estimated future cash flows to be made in respect of all employees at the reporting date. In determining the present value of the liability, estimates of attrition rates and pay increases through promotion and inflation have been taken into account.

Note 4. Operating segments

Identification of reportable operating segments

The Consolidated entity has identified its operating segments based on the investment decisions of the board and used by the chief operating decision makers in assessing performance and in determining the allocation of resources. The Consolidated entity operates in one segment being the evaluation and exploration of resources in Australia.

Accounting policy for operating segments

Operating segments are presented using the 'management approach', where the information presented is on the same basis as the internal reports provided to the Chief Operating Decision Makers ('CODM'). The CODM is responsible for the allocation of resources to operating segments and assessing their performance.

Credit risk

Credit risk refers to the risk that a counterparty will default on its contractual obligations resulting in financial loss to the consolidated entity. The consolidated entity has a strict code of credit, including obtaining agency credit information, confirming references and setting appropriate credit limits. Liquidity risk

The Consolidated entity manages liquidity risk through capital raising activities, and continuously monitoring forecast and actual cash flows and matching the maturity profiles of financial assets and liabilities. The Consolidated entity did not have any undrawn facilities at its disposal as at reporting date. Vigilant liquidity risk management requires the Consolidated entity to maintain sufficient liquid assets (mainly cash and cash equivalents) and available borrowing facilities to be able to pay debts as and when they become due and payable.

The consolidated entity manages liquidity risk by maintaining adequate cash reserves and available borrowing facilities by continuously monitoring actual and forecast cash flows and matching the maturity profiles of financial assets and liabilities.
