EXPLANATORY STATEMENT

This Explanatory Statement has been prepared to provide information which the Directors believe to be material to Shareholders in deciding whether or not to pass the Resolutions.

1. FINANCIAL STATEMENTS AND REPORTS

In accordance with the Corporations Act, the business of the Meeting will include receipt and consideration of the annual financial report of the Company for the financial year ended 30 June 2024 together with the declaration of the Directors, the Directors' report, the Remuneration Report and the auditor's report.

The Company will not provide a hard copy of the Company's annual financial report to Shareholders unless specifically requested to do so. The Company's annual financial report is available on its website at www.industmin.com.

2. RESOLUTION 1 – ADOPTION OF REMUNERATION REPORT

2.1 General

The Corporations Act requires that at a listed company's annual general meeting, a resolution that the remuneration report be adopted must be put to the shareholders. However, such a resolution is advisory only and does not bind the company or the directors of the company.

The remuneration report sets out the company's remuneration arrangements for the directors and senior management of the company. The remuneration report is part of the directors' report contained in the annual financial report of the company for a financial year.

The chair of the meeting must allow a reasonable opportunity for its shareholders to ask questions about or make comments on the remuneration report at the annual general meeting.

2.2 Voting consequences

A company is required to put to its shareholders a resolution proposing the calling of another meeting of shareholders to consider the appointment of directors of the company (**Spill Resolution**) if, at consecutive annual general meetings, at least 25% of the votes cast on a remuneration report resolution are voted against adoption of the remuneration report and at the first of those annual general meetings a Spill Resolution was not put to vote. If required, the Spill Resolution must be put to vote at the second of those annual general meetings.

If more than 50% of votes cast are in favour of the Spill Resolution, the company must convene a shareholder meeting (**Spill Meeting**) within 90 days of the second annual general meeting.

All of the directors of the company who were in office when the directors' report (as included in the company's annual financial report for the most recent financial year) was approved, other than the managing director of the company, will cease to hold office immediately before the end of the Spill Meeting but may stand for re-election at the Spill Meeting.

Following the Spill Meeting those persons whose election or re-election as directors of the company is approved will be the directors of the company.

2.3 Previous voting results

At the Company's previous annual general meeting the votes cast against the remuneration report considered at that annual general meeting were less than 25%. Accordingly, the Spill Resolution is not relevant for this Annual General Meeting.

3. RESOLUTION 2 - RE-ELECTION OF DIRECTOR - ALEX NEULING

3.1 General

The Constitution sets out the requirements for determining which Directors are to retire by rotation at an annual general meeting.

Mr Neuling, who has served as a Director since 25 May 2021, retires by rotation and seeks re-election.

3.2 Qualifications and other material directorships

Mr Neuling is a Chartered Accountant and Chartered Company Secretary with over 15 years corporate and financial experience, including 10 years as Company Secretary, CFO and Director of various ASX listed companies in the Oil & Gas, Mineral Exploration, Biotech & Mining Services. Prior to these roles, Alex worked at Deloitte in London and in Perth.

Mr Neuling is currently a Non-Executive Director of PetroNor E&P Limited (listed on Oslo Axess:PNR) (from April 2020).

Mr Neuling holds no other material, listed directorships.

3.3 Independence

If re-elected the Board considers Mr Neuling will be an independent Director.

3.4 Technical information required by Listing Rule 14.1A

If Resolution 2 is passed, Mr Neuling will be re-elected to the Board as an independent Director.

In the event that Resolution 2 is not passed, Mr Neuling will not join the Board as an independent Director. The Company may seek nominations or otherwise identify suitably qualified candidates to join the Company. As an additional consequence, this may detract from the Board and Company's ability to execute on its strategic vision.

3.5 Board recommendation

The Board has reviewed Mr Neuling's performance since his appointment to the Board and considers that Mr Neuling's skills and experience will continue to enhance the Board's ability to perform its role. Accordingly, the Board supports the re-election of Mr Neuling and recommends that Shareholders vote in favour of Resolution 2.

4. RESOLUTION 3 - APPROVAL OF 7.1A MANDATE

4.1 General

Broadly speaking, and subject to a number of exceptions, Listing Rule 7.1 limits the amount of Equity Securities that a listed company can issue without the approval of its shareholders over any 12-month period to 15% of the fully paid ordinary securities it had on issue at the start of that period.

However, under Listing Rule 7.1A, an eligible entity may seek shareholder approval by way of a special resolution passed at its annual general meeting to increase this 15% limit by an extra 10% to 25% (**7.1A Mandate**).

An 'eligible entity' means an entity which is not included in the S&P/ASX 300 Index and has a market capitalisation of \$300,000,000 or less. The Company is an eligible entity for these purposes.

As at the date of this Notice, the Company is an eligible entity as it is not included in the S&P/ASX 300 Index and has a current market capitalisation of \$14,650,000 (based on the number of Shares on issue and the closing price of Shares on the ASX on 20 October 2024.)

Resolution 3 seeks Shareholder approval by way of special resolution for the Company to have the additional 10% placement capacity provided for in Listing Rule 7.1A to issue Equity Securities without Shareholder approval.

For note, a special resolution is a resolution requiring at least 75% of votes cast by shareholders present and eligible to vote at the meeting in favour of the resolution. If Resolution 3 is passed, the Company will be able to issue Equity Securities up to the combined 25% limit in Listing Rules 7.1 and 7.1A without any further Shareholder approval.

If Resolution 3 is not passed, the Company will not be able to access the additional 10% capacity to issue Equity Securities without Shareholder approval under Listing Rule 7.1A and will remain subject to the 15% limit on issuing Equity Securities without Shareholder approval set out in Listing Rule 7.1.

4.2 Technical information required by Listing Rule 7.1A

Pursuant to and in accordance with Listing Rule 7.3A, the information below is provided in relation to Resolution 3:

(a) Period for which the 7.1A Mandate is valid

The 7.1A Mandate will commence on the date of the Meeting and expire on the first to occur of the following:

- (i) the date that is 12 months after the date of this Meeting;
- (ii) the time and date of the Company's next annual general meeting; and
- (iii) the time and date of approval by Shareholders of any transaction under Listing Rule 11.1.2 (a significant change in the nature or scale of activities) or Listing Rule 11.2 (disposal of the main undertaking).

(b) Minimum price

Any Equity Securities issued under the 7.1A Mandate must be in an existing quoted class of Equity Securities and be issued at a minimum price of 75% of the volume weighted average price of Equity Securities in that class, calculated over the 15 trading days on which trades in that class were recorded immediately before:

- the date on which the price at which the Equity Securities are to be issued is agreed by the entity and the recipient of the Equity Securities; or
- (ii) if the Equity Securities are not issued within 10 trading days of the date in Section 4.2(b)(i), the date on which the Equity Securities are issued.

(c) Use of funds raised under the 7.1A Mandate

The Company intends to use funds raised from issues of Equity Securities under the 7.1A Mandate for continued exploration expenditure at its Western Australian projects and for general working capital.

(d) Risk of Economic and Voting Dilution

Any issue of Equity Securities under the 7.1A Mandate will dilute the interests of Shareholders who do not receive any Shares under the issue.

If Resolution 3 is approved by Shareholders and the Company issues the maximum number of Equity Securities available under the 7.1A Mandate, the economic and voting dilution of existing Shares would be as shown in the table below.

The table below shows the dilution of existing Shareholders calculated in accordance with the formula outlined in Listing Rule 7.1A.2, on the basis of the closing market price of Shares and the number of Equity Securities on issue or proposed to be issued as at 20 October 2024.

The table also shows the voting dilution impact where the number of Shares on issue (Variable A in the formula) changes and the economic dilution where there are changes in the issue price of Shares issued under the 7.1A Mandate.

- The Company has not issued any Equity Securities in the 12 months prior to the Meeting that were not issued under an exception in Listing Rule 7.2 or with approval under Listing Rule 7.1.
- 5. The issue of Equity Securities under the 7.1A Mandate consists only of Shares. It is assumed that no Options are exercised into Shares before the date of issue of the Equity Securities. If the issue of Equity Securities includes quoted Options, it is assumed that those quoted Options are exercised into Shares for the purpose of calculating the voting dilution effect on existing Shareholders.
- 6. The calculations above do not show the dilution that any one particular Shareholder will be subject to. All Shareholders should consider the dilution caused to their own shareholding depending on their specific circumstances.
- 7. This table does not set out any dilution pursuant to approvals under Listing Rule 7.1 unless otherwise disclosed.
- The 10% voting dilution reflects the aggregate percentage dilution against the issued share capital at the time of issue. This is why the voting dilution is shown in each example as 10%.
- The table does not show an example of dilution that may be caused to a particular Shareholder by reason of placements under the 7.1A Mandate, based on that Shareholder's holding at the date of the Meeting.

Shareholders should note that there is a risk that:

- (i) the market price for the Company's Shares may be significantly lower on the issue date than on the date of the Meeting; and
- (ii) the Shares may be issued at a price that is at a discount to the market price for those Shares on the date of issue.

(e) Allocation policy under the 7.1A Mandate

The recipients of the Equity Securities to be issued under the 7.1A Mandate have not yet been determined. However, the recipients of Equity Securities could consist of current Shareholders or new investors (or both), none of whom will be related parties of the Company.

The Company will determine the recipients at the time of the issue under the 7.1A Mandate, having regard to the following factors:

(i) the purpose of the issue;

- (ii) alternative methods for raising funds available to the Company at that time, including, but not limited to, an entitlement issue, share purchase plan, placement or other offer where existing Shareholders may participate;
- (iii) the effect of the issue of the Equity Securities on the control of the Company;
- (iv) the circumstances of the Company, including, but not limited to, the financial position and solvency of the Company;
- (v) prevailing market conditions; and
- (vi) advice from corporate, financial and broking advisers (if applicable).

(f) Previous approval under Listing Rule 7.1A

The Company previously obtained approval from its Shareholders pursuant to Listing Rule 7.1A at its annual general meeting held on 29 November 2023 (**Previous Approval**).

During the 12 month period preceding the date of the Meeting, being on and from 29 November 2023, the Company made the following issue of Equity Securities pursuant to the Previous Approval:

- (i) 4,498,500 fully paid ordinary shares issued on 7 August 2024;
- (ii) Shares were issued to sophisticated investors as part of a total Placement of 8,375,000 ordinary shares;
- (iii) The shares were issued at \$0.20, a discount of 26% to the closing market price on the date of agreement; and
- (iv) Cash consideration totalling \$899,700 was received for the shares issued under the Previous Approval; no funds have yet been spent. Funds will be used to complete a resource infill drilling program at the Pippingarra and Mukinbudin High Purity Quartz (HPQ) projects, progress HPQ metallurgical testwork, continue product marketing and fore general working capital.

The issue of 4,498,500 ordinary shares under Listing Rule 7.1A was subsequently approved by shareholders at a general meeting held 7 October 2024.

4.3 Voting Exclusion Statement

As at the date of this Notice, the Company is not proposing to make an issue of Equity Securities under Listing Rule 7.1A. Accordingly, a voting exclusion statement is not included in this Notice.

5. RESOLUTIONS 4, 5, 6 AND 7 – ISSUE OF OPTIONS TO RELATED PARTIES – JEFFREY SWEET, ASHLEY PATTISON, ALEX NEULING AND MELANIE LEIGHTON

5.1 General

The Company has agreed, subject to obtaining Shareholder approval, to issue a total of 4,750,000 Options (**Director Options**) to Jeffrey Sweet, Ashley Pattison, Alex Neuling and Melanie Leighton (**Related Parties**) as follows:

- (a) 1,500,000 Options to the Managing Director, Jeffrey Sweet, (or his nominee) on the terms and conditions set out below;
- (b) 1,250,000 Options to Ashley Pattison (or his nominee) on the terms and conditions set out below;
- (c) 1,000,000 Options to Alex Neuling (or his nominee) on the terms and conditions set out below; and
- (d) 1,000,000 Options to Melanie Leighton (or her nominee) on the terms and conditions set out below.

Resolutions 4, 5, 6 and 7 seek Shareholder approval for the issue of Director Options to Jeffrey Sweet, Ashley Pattison, Alex Neuling and Melanie Leighton.

5.2 Chapter 2E of the Corporations Act

For a public company, or an entity that the public company controls, to give a financial benefit to a related party of the public company, the public company or entity must:

- (a) Obtain the approval of the public company's members in the manner set out in section 217 to 227 of the Corporations Act; and
- (b) Give the benefit within 15 months following such approval,

Unless the giving of the financial benefit falls within an exception set out in sections 210 to 216 of the Corporations Act.

The issue of Director Options to Jeffrey Sweet, Ashley Pattison, Alex Neuling and Melanie Leighton constitute giving a financial benefit. Jeffrey Sweet, Ashley Pattison, Alex Neuling and Melanie Leighton are related parties of the Company by virtue of being Directors.

The Directors do not consider that one of the exceptions set out in section 210 to 216 of the Corporations Act applies to the issue of the Director Options. Accordingly Shareholder approval for the issue of Director Options to Jeffrey Sweet, Ashley Pattison, Alex Neuling and Melanie Leighton is sought in accordance with Chapter 2E of the Corporations Act.

5.3 Listing Rule 10.11

Listing Rule 10.11 provides that unless one of the exceptions in Listing Rule 10.12 applies, a listed company must not issue or agree to issue equity securities to:

- 10.11.1. a related party
- 10.11.2. a person who is, or was at any time in the 6 months before the issue or agreement a substantial (30%+) holder of the company;
- 10.11.3. a person who is, or was at any time in the 6 months before the issue or agreement a substantial (10%+) holder of the company and who has nominated a director to the board of the company pursuant to a relevant agreement which gives them a right or expectation to do so;
- 10.11.4. an associate of a person referred to in Listing Rules 10.11.1 to 10.11.3
- 10.11.5. a person whose relationship with the company or a person referred to in Listing Rule 10.11.1 to 10.11.4 is such that, in ASX's opinion, the issue or agreement should be approved by shareholders,

unless it obtains the approval of its shareholders.

The issue of Director fall within Listing Rule 10.11.1 and do not fall within any of the exceptions in Listing Rule 10.12. The issues therefore require the approval of Shareholders under Listing Rule 10.11.

Resolutions 4, 5, 6 and 7 seek the required Shareholder approval for the issue of the Director Options under and for the purposes of Chapter 2E of the Corporations Act and Listing Rule 10.11.

5.4 Technical information required by Listing Rule 14.1A

If Resolutions 4, 5, 6 and 7 are passed, the Company will be able to proceed with the issue of the Director Options to Jeffrey Sweet, Ashley Pattison, Alex Neuling and Melanie Leighton within one month after the date of the Meeting (or such later date as permitted by any ASX waiver or modification of the Listing Rules). As approval pursuant to Listing Rule 7.1 is not required for the issue of the Director Options (because approval is being obtained under Listing Rule 10.11), the issue of the Director Options will not use up any of the Company's 15% annual placement capacity.

If one of these Resolutions are not passed, the Company will not be able to proceed with the issue of the Director Options to the Director the subject of the Resolution that was not passed, and the Company may have to identify and implement alternative means of recruiting, retaining and incentivising appropriately qualified and experienced staff members (including potentially cash-based incentive arrangements).

For the sake of clarity, Resolutions 4 to 7 are not interdependent, meaning that if three of these Resolutions are passed and one Resolution is not passed, the Company may proceed with the issue of Director Options to the Directors the subject of the three successful Resolutions.

5.5 Technical information required by Listing Rule 10.13 and section 219 of the Corporations

 - (iv) 1,000,000 Director Options to Melanie Leighton (or their nominee) pursuant to Resolution 7,

each of whom falls within the category set out in Listing Rule 10.11.1 by virtue of being a Director;

- (b) the maximum number of securities to be issued is 4,750,000 comprising:
 - (i) 1,500,000 Director Options to Jeffrey Sweet (or their nominee) pursuant to Resolution 4;
 - (ii) 1,250,000 Director Options to Ashley Pattison (or their nominee) pursuant to Resolution 5;
 - (iii) 1,000,000 Director Options to Alex Neuling (or their nominee) pursuant to Resolution 6; and
 - (iv) 1,000,000 Director Options to Melanie Leighton (or their nominee) pursuant to Resolution 7;
- (c) the terms and conditions of the Director Options are set out in Schedule 1;
- (d) the Director Options will be issued no later than 1 month after the date of the Meeting (or such later date to the extent permitted by any ASX waiver or modification of the Listing Rules) and it is intended that issue of the Director Options will occur on the same date;
- (e) the issue prices of the Director Options will be nil. The Company will not receive any other consideration in respect of the issue of the Director Options (other than in respect of funds received on exercise);
- (f) the purpose of the issues of the Director Options are to provide a performance linked incentive component in the remuneration package for the directors to align the interests of the directors with those of the Shareholders, to motivate and reward the performance of the directors and to provide a cost effective way from the Company to remunerate the directors, which will allow the Company to spend a greater proportion of its cash reserves on its operations than it would if alternative cash forms of remuneration were given to the directors;
- (g) the Options are unquoted Options. The Company has agreed to issue the Options to the Related Parties subject to Shareholder approval for the following reasons:

- the Options are unquoted, therefore, the issue of the Options has no immediate dilutionary impact on Shareholders;
- (ii) the deferred taxation benefit which is available to the Related Parties in respect of an issue of Options is also beneficial to the Company as it means the Related Parties are not required to immediately sell the Options to fund a tax liability (as would be the case in an issue of Shares where the tax liability arises upon issue of the Shares) and will instead, continue to hold an interest in the Company; and
- (iii) it is not considered that there are any significant opportunity costs to the Company or benefits foregone by the Company in issuing the Options on the terms proposed;
- (h) the number of Options to be issued to each of the Related Parties has been determined based upon consideration of:
 - (i) current market standards and/or practices of other ASX listed companies of a similar size and stage of development to the Company;
 - (ii) the remuneration of the Related Parties; and
 - (iii) incentives to attract and ensure continuity of service of the Related Parties who have appropriate knowledge and expertise, while maintaining the Company's cash reserves.

The Company does not consider that there are any significant opportunity costs to the Company or benefits foregone by the Company in issuing the Options upon the terms proposed;

- (p) All of the four Directors of the Company have a material personal interest in the outcome of Resolutions 4, 5, 6 and 7 on the basis that all of the Directors (or their nominees) are to be issued Options should Resolutions 4, 5, 6 and 7 be passed. For this reason, the Directors do not believe that it is appropriate to make a recommendation on Resolutions 4, 5, 6 and 7 of this Notice; and
- (q) the Board is not aware of any other information that is reasonably required by Shareholders to allow them to decide whether it is in the best interests of the Company to pass Resolutions 4, 5, 6 and 7.

6. RESOLUTION 8 - ISSUE OF OPTIONS

6.1 General

The Company has agreed to issue 500,000 Options as an incentive to the Company's Company Secretary and Finance Manager, Natalie Madden. Resolution 8 seeks ratification for the issue of the Options.

6.2 Listing Rule 7.1

Broadly speaking, and subject to a number of exceptions, Listing Rule 7.1 limits the amount of Equity Securities that a listed company can issue without the approval of its shareholders over any 12 month period to 15% of the fully paid ordinary shares it had on issue at the start of that period.

Under Listing Rule 7.1A, an eligible entity can seek approval from its members, by way of a special resolution passed at its annual general meeting, to increase this 15% limit by an extra 10% to 25%.

The Company obtained approval to increase its limit to 25% at the annual general meeting held on 29 November 2023.

The issue of the Options does not fit within any of the exceptions set out in Listing Rule 7.2 and, as it has not yet been approved by Shareholders, it effectively uses up part of the 15% limit in Listing Rule 7.1, reducing the Company's capacity to issue further Equity Securities without Shareholder approval under Listing Rule 7.1 for the 12 month period following the date of issue of the Options.

6.3 Listing Rule 7.4

Listing Rule 7.4 allows the shareholders of a listed company to approve an issue of Equity Securities after it has been made or agreed to be made. If they do, the issue is taken to have been approved under Listing Rule 7.1 and so does not reduce the company's capacity to issue further Equity Securities without shareholder approval under that rule.

The Company wishes to retain as much flexibility as possible to issue additional Equity Securities in the future without having to obtain Shareholder approval for such issues under Listing Rule 7.1. Accordingly, the Company is seeking Shareholder ratification pursuant to Listing Rule 7.4 for the issue of the Options.

Resolution 8 seeks Shareholder ratification pursuant to Listing Rule 7.4 for the issue of the Options.

6.4 Technical information required by Listing Rule 14.1A

If Resolution 8 is passed, the Options will be excluded in calculating the Company's combined 25% limit in Listing Rules 7.1 and 7.1A, effectively increasing the number of Equity Securities the Company can issue without Shareholder approval over the 12 month period following the date of issue of the Options.

If Resolution 8 is not passed, the Options will be included in calculating the Company's combined 25% limit in Listing Rules 7.1 and 7.1A, effectively decreasing the number of Equity Securities that the Company can issue without Shareholder approval over the 12 month period following the date of issue of the Options.

It is noted that the Company's ability to utilise the additional 10% capacity provided for in Listing Rule 7.1A for issues of Equity Securities following this Meeting remains conditional on Resolution 3 being passed at this Meeting.

6.5 Technical information required by Listing Rule 7.5

Pursuant to and in accordance with Listing Rule 7.5, the following information is provided in relation to Resolution 8:

- (a) the Options are to be issued to Ms Natalie Madden;
- (b) 500,000 Options are to be issued. The terms of and conditions of the Options are the same as the Director Options as set out in Schedule 1;
- (c) the Options will be issued on a date no later than 3 months following the date of this meeting;
- (d) the Options will be issued at a nil issue price;
- (e) the purpose of the issue of the Options is to provide a staff incentive; and
- (f) the Options will be issued to Natalie Madden. Terms and conditions of the Options are set out in Schedule 1.
