# OUTSTANDING BOREHOLE NUCLEAR MAGNETIC POROSITY TEST RESULTS AT JAM24-02 FORMENTERA LITHIUM BRINE PROJECT, ARGENTINA

- Porosity of Well 2 exceeded **25% at all five core intervals** specific yield (drainable brine) average of **13% and a maximum of 50%**.
- Well 2 (JAM24-02), which attained a drilling depth of 346m, was surveyed with a BMR tool and achieved a depth of 314m. There was a high correlation between the cores tested in Perth Australia and the gamma porosity measurements using the bore hole tool.
- The maximum total porosity measured by the BMR was **52%** and minimum 11% and the average over the surveyed length of **31%**.
- Movable water and capillary volumes were excellent.

**Patagonia Lithium Ltd (ASX:PL3, Patagonia** or **Company)** is very pleased to announce receipt of the completed Borehole Magnetic Resonance (BMR) survey showing that the aquifer can withstand high pump rates from the exceptional porosity and deep aquifer.



Sustaining these pump rates of 2,500L/hour at well three and 3,500L/hour at well 4 demonstrates the viability of the project. The Borehole Magnetic Resonance survey has confirmed the high porosity from 40 metres to 314m. The Sy (specific yield) value is the drainable value which is excellent at average 13% (24% from cores sampled) with a maximum of 50%. This data has **substantial implications for the Mineral Resource calculation**".




Figure 3. Plot of specific yield to depth showing red squares were values achieved by core tests and line from gamma. They are more highly correlated with depth with one outlier reflecting a more porous sample.




Figure 4. Map location and altitude profile with JAM 24-02 shown in north east corner.

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### About Patagonia Lithium Ltd

Patagonia Lithium (ASX:PL3) has two major lithium brine projects – Formentera/Cilon in Salar de Jama, Jujuy province and Tomas III at Incahuasi Salar in Salta Province of northern Argentina in the declared lithium triangle. It has been granted 24/25 applications covering 40,000 Has of concessions exploring for ionic REE clays, Niobium, and lithium in pegmatites. The Company has five exploration concession packages. Four have been granted in Minas Gerais, Mato Grosso and Goais states.

Since listing on 31 March 2023, surface sampling and MT geophysics have been completed, drill holes JAM 24-01,24-02, and 24-03 completed and JAM 24-10 (well 4) is underway. Progress to date has been exceptional as measured by lithium assays. The MT Geophysics at Tomas III on Incahuasi salar is very prospective. In July 2023, a 10 hole drill program was approved for Formentera and a three well program for Cilon is pending. Samples as **high as 1,100ppm lithium** (2 June 2023 announcement) were recorded at Formentera and a Lithium value of **591ppm in well JAM 24-01** (Outstanding Assay Results from First Drilling in Argentina released on 3 May 2024). Very low resistivities were recorded to more than a kilometre depth during the MT Geophysics survey at Formentera.
