Annual Report - 30 June 2026

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Dear Shareholders,

It is our privilege to present Cambium Bio Limited's Annual Report for the year ended 30 June 2026, a year in which the Company converted the regulatory foundations laid in FY2025 into a single, executable pivotal Phase 3 program for Elate Ocular® and secured independent commercial validation of its human platelet lysate platform.

Strategy and execution

Our strategy is unchanged: deliver a high-quality, registration-enabling pivotal program for Elate Ocular® in dry eye disease (DED), then unlock value through partnering or strategic alternatives once dosing is underway. The defining event of the year came on 22 April 2026 when, following a Type D meeting, the U.S. FDA confirmed that a single adequate and well-controlled pivotal clinical study, together with confirmatory evidence, is a reasonable approach to support a Biologics License Application (BLA) for Elate Ocular®. The move from a two-trial to a single-trial pathway substantially reduces development cost, shortens the development timeline and improves the probability of delivering a successful BLA data package.

We moved immediately to convert this outcome into an accepted regulatory package. On 3 June 2026 we submitted an amendment to our Investigational New Drug application comprising the updated Phase 3 protocol, statistical analysis plan, viral clearance summary, and equivalency and comparability protocols. The FDA has raised no objection, and we are proceeding on that basis. Our pivotal study, CAMOMILE-2, will enrol 515 patients to deliver 475 evaluable completers on a randomised, double-masked, vehicle-controlled design, with co-primary endpoints in signs (Corneal Fluorescein Staining Index) and symptoms (VAS Eye Discomfort Score). Ethics approvals for the updated protocol have been confirmed in both Australia (Bellberry HREC) and the United States (Advarra IRB), and a three-step orthogonal pathogen inactivation process was developed to strengthen the product's viral safety profile ahead of Phase 3 manufacture.

Partnering and commercial progress

FY2026 delivered further commercial progress for our platform. In September 2025 we entered into a manufacturing memorandum of understanding with Locus Cell Co., Ltd for commercial production of the Active Biologic Ingredient for Elate Ocular®. Recurring royalty income from our FD hPL cell culture supplement products continued throughout the year and, from April 2026, is received directly from our long-standing partner ZYBT following its resumption of direct manufacturing and commercialisation. In June 2026 we held approximately 35 meetings, the majority partnering-related, at the BIO International Convention in San Diego, with interest expressed in United States, European and Asian territories.

Funding and financial discipline

We maintained tight cost discipline, with net operating cash outflows of A\$2.807 million for the year and approximately 63% of operating payments directed to research and development. During the year we raised A\$4.573 million through placements completed in July 2025 and March 2026, each at a premium to the prevailing market price, including an A\$2.4 million strategic investment by our largest shareholder ZYBT at a 20% premium. After year end, we completed a further A\$1.008 million placement at a 17.1% premium and executed an A\$3.75 million secured facility to pre-finance our FY2027 R&D Tax Incentive refund, and we expect an FY2026 R&D Tax Incentive refund in October or November 2026. In October 2025 we also received approval of our Advance Overseas Finding, covering eligible overseas expenditure on the pivotal Phase 3 program through FY2027. We ended the year with A\$1.116 million in cash.

Outlook

Our objective is First Patient In for CAMOMILE-2 in the fourth quarter of calendar 2026, subject to additional funding, with topline data targeted for the fourth quarter of calendar 2027 and a rolling BLA submission under Fast Track designation targeted for mid-calendar 2028. In parallel, we intend to consider a structured out-licensing process once the pivotal trial has commenced and the timing of topline data can be established with greater confidence.

Thank you

On behalf of the Board and executive team, we thank our shareholders for their continued support, our investigators and partners for their collaboration, and our employees for their commitment to rigorous science and disciplined execution. With the FDA-confirmed single pivotal trial pathway, an accepted regulatory package, dual-jurisdiction ethics approvals and manufacturing readiness advancing, Cambium Bio enters FY2027 with a clear pathway to pivotal execution and value creation.

Principal activities

Cambium Bio Limited (ASX: CMB) is a clinical-stage regenerative medicine company headquartered in Sydney, Australia, with a focus on developing innovative biologics for ophthalmology and tissue repair applications. The Company's core technology platform is based on human platelet lysate, which is being leveraged to create a pipeline of novel therapeutics.

Our primary focus is on ophthalmology, with our lead product candidate, Elate Ocular, being developed to address significant unmet medical needs in the treatment of dry eye disease. Elate Ocular is advancing towards Phase 3 clinical trials, positioning Cambium Bio at the forefront of regenerative medicine in ophthalmology.

In addition to our ophthalmology program, we continue to develop our mesenchymal stem cell platform, Progenza, which is being applied to potential therapies for knee osteoarthritis and other tissue repair indications. This diversified approach allows us to explore multiple avenues within the regenerative medicine space.

Following our merger with Cambium Medical Technologies, LLC in April 2024, we have strengthened our position in the regenerative medicine field, combining complementary technologies and expertise. Cambium Bio remains committed to advancing its pipeline through clinical development and commercialisation, with the ultimate goal of providing transformative treatments to improve patient outcomes across multiple indications.

Operating and financial review

Review of operations

During the year ended 30 June 2026, Cambium Bio converted the regulatory foundations secured in FY2025 into a single, executable pivotal Phase 3 program for Elate Ocular®, advanced manufacturing and partnering arrangements for its human platelet lysate platform and strengthened its funding position through placements completed at a premium to market.

Regulatory and clinical progress

On 11 July 2025, the US FDA confirmed that all remaining CMC comparability requirements had been satisfied, formally clearing the Company to begin patient dosing in its Phase 3 trials. In October 2025, the Department of Industry, Science and Resources approved the Company's Advance Overseas Finding application, covering the pivotal Phase 3 program from FY2025 through FY2027 for the purposes of the Australian R&D Tax Incentive.

The defining regulatory event of the year occurred on 22 April 2026 when, following a Type D meeting with the FDA's Center for Biologics Evaluation and Research, the Agency confirmed that a single adequate and well-controlled pivotal clinical study, together with confirmatory evidence, is a reasonable approach to support a Biologics License Application (BLA) for Elate Ocular® in moderate-to-severe dry eye disease. The single-trial pathway substantially reduces development cost, accelerates the development timeline and concentrates statistical risk in one well-powered study.

On 3 June 2026, the Company submitted an amendment to its Investigational New Drug application comprising the updated Phase 3 protocol, statistical analysis plan, viral clearance summary, and equivalency and comparability protocols. The FDA acknowledged receipt and, as at the date of this report, has raised no objection. The pivotal study, CAMOMILE-2, will enrol 515 patients to deliver 475 evaluable completers on a randomised, double-masked, vehicle-controlled, multicentre design over a nine-week masked treatment period, followed by an open-label long-term safety extension, with co-primary endpoints in signs (Corneal Fluorescein Staining Index) and symptoms (VAS Eye Discomfort Score). Ethics approvals for the updated protocol were confirmed by Bellberry HREC in Australia and Advarra IRB in the United States shortly after year end.

CMC and manufacturing

During the year the Company developed a three-step orthogonal pathogen inactivation process for Elate Ocular®, comprising low pH treatment, UV-C exposure and terminal gamma irradiation, to strengthen the product's viral safety profile. Preliminary equivalency testing supported product equivalency for the new steps. Release testing methods and the Phase 3 stability protocol were progressed, cleanroom capacity was reserved with the Company's contract development and manufacturing organisation, and manufacture of the engineering batch and the first clinical batch is targeted for the second half of calendar 2026.

Partnering and manufacturing arrangements

In September 2025 the Company entered into a manufacturing memorandum of understanding with Locus Cell Co., Ltd for contract manufacture of the Active Biologic Ingredient for Elate Ocular®. In June 2026 the Company attended the BIO International Convention in San Diego, holding approximately 35 meetings, the majority partnering-related, with counterparties expressing interest in United States rights and, separately, in European and Asian territories.

The Company continued to generate recurring royalty income from its FD hPL cell culture supplement products. In April 2026, ZYBT resumed direct manufacture and commercialisation of the cell culture supplement, which it had previously sublicensed to AventaCell, and from that date the Company's royalty income is generated directly by ZYBT.

Corporate

The composition of the Board was unchanged during the year. At the Annual General Meeting held on 16 October 2025, all resolutions were passed, including approval of the Company's additional 10% placement capacity under ASX Listing Rule 7.1A. At a general meeting held on 16 March 2026, shareholders approved the related party placement to ZYBT announced in January 2026.

Funding and liquidity

During the year the Company received A\$4.573 million from equity issues, comprising the placement announced on 30 July 2025 at A\$0.4637 per share (announced at A\$2.12 million and upsized to A\$2.17 million on completion, a 60% premium to the prior closing price) and the A\$2.4 million strategic placement to ZYBT at A\$0.55 per share announced on 20 January 2026, a 20% premium to the prior closing price, approved by shareholders in March 2026. Cash and cash equivalents as at 30 June 2026 were A\$1.116 million. Subsequent to year end, the Company completed an A\$1.008 million placement at a 17.10% premium in July 2026, executed an A\$3.75 million secured facility to pre-finance its FY2027 R&D Tax Incentive refund, and expects an FY2026 R&D Tax Incentive refund of approximately A\$1.0 million in October or November 2026.

Outlook

The Company is focused on executing the contract research organisation agreements, manufacturing the Phase 3 engineering and first clinical batches, activating sites in Australia and the United States, and achieving First Patient In for CAMOMILE-2 in the fourth quarter of calendar 2026, subject to additional funding. Topline data are targeted for the fourth quarter of calendar 2027, with a rolling BLA submission under Fast Track designation targeted for mid-calendar 2028. In parallel, the Company intends to consider a structured out-licensing process following commencement of the pivotal trial, and to advance regional licensing discussions as a potential source of non-dilutive capital.

Financial review

Operating results

The Group's operating result for the year was a loss of \$4.1 million (2025: loss of \$3.8 million). Gross profit for the year was \$0.452 million (2025: \$0.469 million). Grants, R&D incentive and other income for the year was \$0.596 million (2025: \$0.138 million).

Research and development expenses

Research and development activities in FY2026 continued to focus on CMC readiness, GMP drug-product manufacture and Phase 3 start-up for Elate Ocular®. Consistent with the Group's accounting policy and applicable standards, all research and development costs are expensed as incurred; the Directors do not consider the Group can demonstrate all requirements to capitalise development expenditure. Research and development expenditure for the year was \$3.26 million (2025: \$2.76 million).

Corporate expenses

Corporate and administration expenses for the year were \$1.548 million (2025: \$2.004 million), reflecting disciplined overhead management through the Phase 3 preparation period.

Finance costs

Finance costs of \$13,735 (2025: \$34,980) primarily related to foreign exchange conversion, international transaction fees, and the unsecured Georgia Research Alliance (GRA) loans. The remaining GRA note of US\$98,000 at 5% per annum matured on 7 August 2026 and was repaid in full, with accrued interest, after year end.

Financial position and cash flows

Operating cash receipts for the year totalled A\$1.25 million, comprising royalty income, R&D tax incentive proceeds, and other operating inflows. The Company also received A\$0.012 million in interest income during the year. These inflows partially offset operating cash outflows of A\$4.07 million as the Company advanced Phase 3 readiness, resulting in net operating cash outflows of A\$2.807 million for the year. Investing cash outflows were A\$0.323 million, which primarily related to legacy merger-related legal costs. Financing activities generated net cash inflows of A\$4.24 million, comprising A\$4.57 million raised through equity issuances, partially offset by A\$0.011 million of share issue costs and A\$0.32 million in repayments of maturing unsecured Georgia Research Alliance (GRA) notes. After accounting for foreign exchange movements, the Company ended the period with a cash balance of A\$1.116 million as at 30 June 2026.

The Company expects net operating cash outflows to increase as the pivotal Phase 3 clinical trial commences. The Company completed an A\$1.008 million capital raise in July 2026 and expects to receive an FY2026 R&D Tax Incentive refund of approximately A\$1.0 million in October or November 2026 and has executed an A\$3.75 million secured facility to pre-finance its FY2027 R&D Tax Incentive refund. Based on its available cash reserves and expected funding, the Company believes it has sufficient resources to continue operations and can manage the timing of research and development expenditure to align with available funding.

Material risks

There are a number of risks that may materially and adversely affect the future operating and financial performance of Cambium Bio. While some of these risks may be mitigated by Cambium Bio's actions and decision-making processes, others are outside the control of the Company. These material risks include, but are not limited to, the following:

(a) Regulatory and approval risks

Although the FDA has cleared the Company's Phase 3 protocol and concurred with the potency-assay strategy, health authorities may impose additional or different requirements to initiate or complete dry eye disease trials or to approve products for marketing. This may include requests for further CMC comparability work, acceptance of the bioassay and release specifications, post-marketing commitments, or labelling restrictions. Similar evolving expectations by non-US regulators could also affect timelines, cost, and the probability of approval.

(b) Funding risks

As a clinical-stage biotechnology company, Cambium Bio relies on external funding to advance its programs. There is a risk that additional capital (equity, partnerships or non-dilutive funding) may not be available when required or on acceptable terms. Insufficient funding could delay, scale back or suspend the Phase 3 program and related activities necessary for a future BLA.

(c) Insolvency risks

With limited operating revenue, there remains a risk that the Company may exhaust available cash and be unable to continue as a going concern. While the Board has undertaken capital-raising initiatives and expects to receive an R&D Tax Incentive refund, there is no guarantee these measures will be sufficient or timely.

(d) Clinical trial risks

There are inherent risks associated with clinical development, including unanticipated safety findings, lack of efficacy, failure to meet primary endpoints, variability across sites and regions, recruitment and retention challenges, protocol deviations, and confounding seasonal or environmental effects in dry eye disease. Any of these could negatively affect the Phase 3 program's timing, costs or outcome.

(e) Manufacturing, quality and supply-chain risks

Elate Ocular® is a donor-sourced, pooled biologic product that must meet stringent cGMP, sterility and viral-inactivation requirements. Risks include raw-material variability, batch failure, assay drift, supply interruptions, deviations or observations arising from regulatory inspections, and capacity or performance issues at external CMOs and testing laboratories. Failure to consistently meet specifications could delay trials or regulatory review and increase costs.

(f) Intellectual IP risks

The Company's success depends in part on obtaining and maintaining robust intellectual-property protection for its technologies and product candidates. There is a risk that patent protection may be limited, challenged, circumvented or may expire before commercial returns are realised, allowing competitors to develop similar products.

(g) Commercialisation and market-access risks

Even if clinical trials succeed and regulatory approval is obtained; commercial outcomes are uncertain. Market acceptance, competitive dynamics in dry eye disease, pricing and reimbursement decisions, distribution arrangements, and healthcare-policy changes may limit uptake or compress margins.

(h) Key personnel and third-party dependency risks

Cambium Bio's progress depends on retaining and attracting qualified scientific, clinical, regulatory and commercial personnel and on the performance of third parties (including CROs, CMOs, clinical sites and key suppliers). Loss of critical staff, or under-performance or default by counterparties, could impair execution of the Phase 3 program and broader strategy.

The above list is not exhaustive. It excludes general macroeconomic and market risks that affect most companies. Biotechnology product development is inherently high-risk, and investors should carefully consider these risks, together with those described elsewhere in this report, before making an investment decision.

Cash flows

Operating activities

Operating cash receipts for the year totalled A\$1.25 million, with A\$0.666 million for royalties and A\$0.584 million for R&D incentive. Cash operating outflows reflected the scale-up to Phase 3 readiness and comprised A\$2.567 million for research and development, A\$0.922 million for staff costs and A\$0.539 million for administration and corporate costs. Interest received was A\$0.012 million and finance costs paid were A\$0.041 million. In aggregate, the Group recorded net operating cash outflows of A\$2.807 million for the twelve months to 30 June 2026.

Investing activities

Investing cash outflows were A\$0.323 million for the year, primarily legacy merger-related legal expenses of A\$0.320 million, with only immaterial capital expenditure of A\$0.003 million.

Financing activities and cash at end of period

Financing cash inflows for the year were A\$4.573 million from equity issues, against cash outflows of A\$0.319 million to repay maturing tranches of the unsecured Georgia Research Alliance (GRA) notes, and A\$0.011 million of transaction costs relating to the issue of equity securities for net financing cash inflows of A\$4.243 million. After an unfavourable foreign exchange movement of A\$0.164 million on cash held, cash and cash equivalents at 30 June 2026 were A\$1.116 million.

Subsequent to year end, the Company secured commitments to raise A\$1.008 million through a fully subscribed share placement. The Board also expects to receive an FY2026 R&D Tax Incentive refund and has executed an A\$3.75 million secured loan facility with Rockford RDF Pty Ltd on 5 August 2026 to pre-finance its FY2027 R&D Tax Incentive refund. The facility is secured over the FY2027 refund receivable and its proceeds only and was undrawn at the date of this report.

At period end, the Group's only debt facility was the unsecured Georgia Research Alliance note of AU\$149,804 (US\$98,000), bearing interest at 5% per annum. The note matured on 7 August 2026 and was repaid in full, with accrued interest, after year end.

Significant changes in the state of affairs

Other than the matters referred to in the review of operations, there were no significant changes in the state of affairs of the Group during the financial year.

Changes in accounting policy

There were no changes in accounting policy during the reporting period.

Matters subsequent to the end of the financial year

The following matters have arisen since 30 June 2026:

On 22 July 2026, the Company announced a firm commitment to raise A\$1,008,000 through the issue of 2,100,000 fully paid ordinary shares at A\$0.48 per share, a 17.1% premium to the closing price on 21 July 2026, under the Company's existing placement capacity under ASX Listing Rule 7.1A. Settlement and issue of the shares occurred in July 2026.

On 5 August 2026, the Company executed a secured loan facility of A\$3,750,000 with Rockford RDF Pty Ltd to pre-finance the Group's FY2027 R&D Tax Incentive refund. The facility is secured over the FY2027 refund receivable and its proceeds only, and was undrawn at the date of this report.

The remaining tranche of the unsecured Georgia Research Alliance note of AU\$149,804 (US\$98,000) matured on 7 August 2026 and was repaid in full, with accrued interest.

No other matter or circumstance has arisen since 30 June 2026 that has significantly affected, or may significantly affect the Group's operations, the results of those operations, or the Group's state of affairs in future financial years.

Corporate Governance Statement

The Board is committed to achieving and demonstrating the highest standards of corporate governance. As part of this agreement, Cambium Bio/CMT granted ZYBT worldwide manufacturing rights for the FD hPL Active Biologic Ingredient (ABI) for cell culture supplements and dry eye disease product categories. Additionally, ZYBT was granted commercialisation rights for Elate Ocular®, the dry eye disease product, in three specific geographic markets: China, Singapore, and Taiwan. Cambium Bio/CMT retains commercialisation rights for Elate Ocular® in all other global markets. The royalty income earned since the merger closed is US\$518,988. Historically, ZYBT sublicensed the manufacture and commercialisation of the FD hPL cell culture supplement to AventaCell, and the Group's royalty income was generated from AventaCell's sales of these products. In April 2026, ZYBT resumed direct manufacture and commercialisation of the cell culture supplement, and from that date the Group's royalty income is generated directly by ZYBT under the same agreement.

Note 1. Nature of operations

Cambium Bio Limited (ASX: CMB) is a clinical-stage regenerative medicine company headquartered in Sydney, Australia. The Company focuses on developing innovative biologics for ophthalmology and tissue repair applications, leveraging its proprietary human platelet lysate technology platform.

The Company's lead product candidate, Elate Ocular[®], is being developed to address significant unmet medical needs in the treatment of dry eye disease. As of 30 June 2026, Elate Ocular[®] is advancing towards Phase 3 clinical trials, marking a significant milestone in the Company's development pipeline.

On 5 April 2024, Cambium Bio successfully acquired Cambium Medical Technologies, LLC, strengthening its position in the regenerative medicine space and expanding its technological capabilities.

Cambium Bio operates in a rapidly evolving field of regenerative medicine, where the primary goal is to enhance the body's natural ability to replace tissue damaged or destroyed by injury or disease. The Company is committed to advancing its pipeline through clinical development and commercialisation, with the ultimate aim of providing transformative treatments to improve patient outcomes across multiple indications.

Where commercial opportunities are identified, the Company seeks to enter into strategic partnerships or licensing agreements to maximise the potential of its technologies and product candidates.

Note 2. General information and statement of compliance

The financial report is a general purpose financial report that has been prepared in accordance with Australian Accounting Standards (including Australian Accounting Interpretations), other authoritative pronouncements of the Australian Accounting Standards Board and the Corporations Act 2001.

Cambium Bio is a for-profit entity for the purpose of preparing the financial statements.

The financial statements cover Cambium Bio and its controlled entities as a consolidated entity (the Group). As at 30 June 2026, Cambium Bio is a public company, incorporated and domiciled in Australia.

The address of its registered office and its principal place of business is Unit 2.06, 31 Lexington Dr, Bella Vista, NSW 2153, Australia.

Statement of compliance

Compliance with Australian Accounting Standards ensures that the financial statements and notes of Cambium Bio comply with International Financial Reporting Standards (IFRS) as issued by the IASB.

The consolidated financial statements for the year ended 30 June 2026 were approved and authorised for issue by the Board of Directors on 28 August 2026.

Basis of preparation

The financial statements have been prepared on an accruals basis and are based on historical costs modified by the revaluation of selected non-current assets and financial instruments for which the fair value basis of accounting has been applied.

New Accounting Standards and Interpretations not yet mandatory or early adopted

Australian Accounting Standards and Interpretations that have recently been issued or amended but are not yet mandatory, have not been early adopted by the consolidated entity for the annual reporting period ended 30 June 2026. The consolidated entity's assessment of the impact of these new or amended Accounting Standards and Interpretations, most relevant to the consolidated entity, are set out below.

Note 2. General information and statement of compliance (continued)

AASB 18 Presentation and Disclosure in Financial Statements

This standard is applicable to annual reporting periods beginning on or after 1 January 2027 and early adoption is permitted. The standard replaces IAS 1 'Presentation of Financial Statements', with many of the original disclosure requirements retained and there will be no impact on the recognition and measurement of items in the financial statements. But the standard will affect presentation and disclosure in the financial statements, including introducing five categories in the statement of profit or loss and other comprehensive income: operating, investing, financing, income taxes and discontinued operations. The standard introduces two mandatory sub-totals in the statement: 'Operating profit' and 'Profit before financing and income taxes'. There are also new disclosure requirements for 'management-defined performance measures', such as earnings before interest, taxes, depreciation and amortisation ('EBITDA') or 'adjusted profit'. The standard provides enhanced guidance on grouping of information (aggregation and disaggregation), including whether to present this information in the primary financial statements or in the notes. The consolidated entity will adopt this standard from 1 July 2027, and it is expected that there will be a significant change to the layout of the statement of profit or loss and other comprehensive income.

Accounting standards issued but not yet effective and not adopted early by the Group

At the date of authorisation of these financial statements, there were no new standards, amendments and interpretations to existing standards published but not yet effective, that are relevant to the Group, that have not been adopted by the Group.

Note 3. Summary of material accounting policies

Overall considerations

The material accounting policies that have been used in the preparation of these consolidated financial statements are summarised below.

The consolidated financial statements have been prepared using the measurement bases specified by the Australian Accounting Standards for each type of asset, liability, income and expense. The measurement bases are more fully described in the following accounting policies.

a. Basis of consolidation

Controlled entities

The Group financial statements consolidate those of the Parent Company and all of its subsidiaries as of 30 June 2026. The parent controls a subsidiary if it is exposed, or has rights, to variable returns from its involvement with the subsidiary and has the ability to affect those returns through its power over the subsidiary. All subsidiaries have a reporting date of 30 June.

All transactions and balances between Group companies are eliminated on consolidation, including unrealised gains and losses on transactions between Group companies. Where unrealised losses on intra-group asset sales are reversed on consolidation, the underlying asset is also tested for impairment from a group perspective.

Amounts reported in the financial statements of subsidiaries have been adjusted where necessary to ensure consistency with the accounting policies adopted by the Group.

Profit or loss and other comprehensive income of subsidiaries acquired or disposed of during the year are recognised from the effective date of acquisition, or up to the effective date of disposal, as applicable.

b. Segment reporting

Operating segments are presented using the 'management approach', where the information presented is on the same basis as the internal reports provided to the Chief Operating Decision Makers (CODM). The CODM is responsible for the allocation of resources to operating segments and assessing their performance.

The Group's operating segment is based on the internal reports that are reviewed and used by the Board of Directors (being the CODM) in assessing performance and determining the allocation of resources.

Reports provided to the CODM reference the Group operating in one segment, being the development of innovative biologics for ophthalmology and tissue repair applications, leveraging its proprietary human platelet lysate technology. The primary focus is on developing Elate Ocular® for dry eye disease, with additional efforts in knee osteoarthritis and other tissue repair indications through the Progenza™ platform. The information reported to the CODM, on a quarterly basis, is profit or loss before tax, assets and liabilities, and cash flow.

Note 3. Summary of material accounting policies (continued)

c. Going concern basis of accounting

The Directors have prepared the financial statements on a going concern basis which contemplates continuity of normal activities and realisation of assets and settlement of liabilities in the normal course of business. In making their going concern assessment the Directors have considered the following:

The company made a loss of \$4,096,091 (30 June 2025: \$3,844,251). As at 30 June 2026 the company has net assets of \$2,379,028 (30 June 2025: \$1,835,748). As at 30 June 2026 the company has net current liabilities of \$72,986 (30 June 2025: \$825,440). The company had operating cash outflows of \$2,807,192 (30 June 2025: \$5,242,015).

The company raised \$4.57 million of share capital during the year through placements completed in July 2025 and January 2026, each at a premium to the prevailing market price. Subsequent to year end, the company completed a further \$1.008 million placement in July 2026, executed a \$3.75 million secured loan facility on 5 August 2026 to pre-finance its FY2027 R&D Tax Incentive refund (undrawn at the date of this report), and expects to receive an FY2026 R&D Tax Incentive refund of approximately in October or November 2026.

As a clinical-stage biotechnology company, Cambium Bio relies heavily on external funding to support its business model and advance its clinical programs. The Company is proactively having capital-raising discussions with investment advisors, pharmaceutical companies, and other strategic partners to secure additional funding necessary to sponsor Phase 3 trials of Elate Ocular®.

The Company acquired intangible assets from Cambium Medical Technologies, LLC: 1) Royalty agreements with Emory University and Zheng Yang Biomedical Technology Co. and 2) Elate Ocular®.

The Group's material research and development expenditure is discretionary and is committed only once the corresponding funding is available, and the Group is able to manage the timing and pace of the pivotal Phase 3 program in line with funding available to it. The continuing ability of the Group to continue as a going concern and to complete its planned activities is dependent on further capital raising and the receipt of R&D Tax Incentive refunds.

In the event that the Group is unable to achieve the above, there is a material uncertainty that may cast significant doubt as to whether the Group will continue as a going concern and therefore proceed with realising its assets and discharging its liabilities in the normal course of business at the amounts stated in the financial report.

The consolidated financial statements do not include any adjustment relating to the recoverability or classification of recorded asset amounts or to the amounts or classification of liabilities that may be necessary should the Group not be able to continue as a going concern.

d. Cash and cash equivalents

Cash comprises cash on hand and demand deposits. Cash equivalents are short-term, highly liquid investments that are readily convertible to known amounts of cash, which are subject to an insignificant risk of changes in value.

e. Income tax

The income tax expense (income) for the year comprises current income tax expense (income) and deferred tax expense (income). Current and deferred income tax expense (income) is charged or credited directly to other comprehensive income instead of the profit or loss when the tax relates to items that are credited or charged directly to other comprehensive income.

Tax expense recognised in profit or loss comprises the sum of deferred tax and current tax not recognised in other comprehensive income or directly in equity.

Current income tax assets and/or liabilities comprise those obligations to, or claims from, the Australian Taxation Office (ATO) and other fiscal authorities relating to the current or prior reporting periods, that are unpaid at the reporting date. Calculation of current tax is based on tax rates and tax laws that have been enacted or substantively enacted by the end of the reporting period.

Deferred income taxes are calculated using the liability method on temporary differences between the carrying amounts of assets and liabilities and their tax bases. However, deferred tax is not provided on the initial recognition of goodwill or on the initial recognition of an asset or liability unless the related transaction is an asset acquisition or affects tax or accounting profit.

Note 3. Summary of material accounting policies (continued)

Deferred tax on temporary differences associated with investments in subsidiaries and joint ventures is not provided if reversal of these temporary differences can be controlled by the Group and it is probable that reversal will not occur in the foreseeable future. Deferred tax assets and liabilities are calculated, without discounting, at tax rates that are expected to apply to their respective period of realisation, provided they are enacted or substantively enacted by the end of the reporting period.

Deferred tax assets are recognised to the extent that it is probable that they will be able to be utilised against future taxable income, based on the Group's forecast of future operating results which is adjusted for significant non-taxable income and expenses and specific limits to the use of any unused tax loss or credit. Deferred tax liabilities are always provided for in full.

Deferred tax assets and liabilities are offset only when the Group has a right and intention to set off current tax assets and liabilities from the same taxation authority.

Changes in deferred tax assets or liabilities are recognised as a component of tax income or expense in profit or loss, except where they relate to items that are recognised in other comprehensive income (such as the revaluation of land) or directly in equity, in which case the related deferred tax is also recognised in other comprehensive income or equity, respectively.

f. Plant and equipment

Each class of property, plant and equipment is carried at cost less, where applicable, any accumulated depreciation and impairment losses.

Subsequent costs are included in the asset's carrying amount or recognised as a separate asset, as appropriate, only when it is probable that future economic benefits associated with the item will flow to the Group and the cost of the item can be measured reliably. All other repairs and maintenance are charged to the statement of profit or loss and other comprehensive income during the financial period in which they are incurred.

g. Intangibles

Intangible assets include acquired 1) Royalty agreements with Emory University and Zheng Yang Biomedical Technology Co. and 2) Elate Ocular®. Intangible assets are accounted for using the cost model whereby capitalised costs are amortised on a reducing balance basis over their estimated useful lives, as these assets are considered finite. Amortisation commences from the date the asset is brought into use. The amortisation of the Elate Ocular asset will commence once production commences. The useful life will be the life of the license. Acquired assets are capitalised on the basis of the costs incurred to acquire the assets. Subsequent expenditure is expensed as incurred.

Costs associated with maintaining intangibles are expensed as incurred.

The Group has reviewed its policy not to capitalise development costs unless they meet the criteria as set in AASB 138. All development costs not meeting the recognition criteria of AASB 138 are expensed.

h. Impairment of non-financial assets

At each reporting date, the Group reviews the carrying amounts of its tangible and intangible assets to determine whether there is any indication that the assets may be impaired. If any such indication exists, or when annual impairment testing for an asset is required (i.e. intangible assets with indefinite useful lives and intangible assets not yet available for use), the Group makes an estimate of the asset's recoverable amount.

An asset's recoverable amount is the higher of its fair value less costs to sell and its value in use and is determined for an individual asset, unless the asset does not generate cash inflows that are largely independent of those from other assets or groups of assets and the asset's value in use cannot be estimated to be close to its fair value. In such cases the asset is tested for impairment as part of the cash generating unit to which it belongs.

When the carrying amount of an asset or cash-generating unit exceeds its recoverable amount, the asset or cash-generating unit is considered impaired and is written down to its recoverable amount.

Note 3. Summary of material accounting policies (continued)

To determine the value-in-use, management estimates expected future cash flows from each asset or cash-generating unit and determines a suitable interest rate in order to calculate the present value of those cash flows. The data used for impairment testing procedures are directly linked to the Group's latest approved budget, adjusted as necessary to exclude the effects of future reorganisations and asset enhancements. Discount factors are determined individually for each asset or cash-generating unit and reflect management's assessment of respective risk profiles, such as market and asset-specific risks factors.

Impairment losses relating to continuing operations are recognised in those expense categories consistent with the function of the impaired asset unless the asset is carried at revalued amount (in which case the impairment loss is treated as a revaluation decrease).

i. Leases

Leases are capitalised by recording an asset and a liability at the lower of the amounts equal to the fair value of the leased property or the present value of the minimum lease payments, including any guaranteed residual values. Lease payments are allocated between the reduction of the lease liability and the lease interest expense for the period.

Leased assets are depreciated on a straight-line basis over the shorter of their estimated useful lives or the lease term.

Where practical exemptions for short term and low value leases are applied, expenses are recognised as incurred.

j. Foreign currency transactions and balances

Functional and presentation currency

The functional currency of each entity is measured using the currency of the primary economic environment in which that entity operates. The consolidated financial statements are presented in Australian dollars which is the consolidated entity's functional and presentation currency.

Transaction and balances

Foreign currency transactions are translated into functional currency using the exchange rates prevailing at the date of the transaction. Foreign currency monetary items are translated at the year-end exchange rate. Non-monetary items measured at historical cost continue to be carried at the exchange rate at the date of the transaction. Non-monetary items measured at fair value are reported at the exchange rate at the date when fair values were determined.

Exchange differences arising on the translation of monetary items are recognised in the statement of profit or loss and other comprehensive income.

k. Financial instruments

Financial assets and financial liabilities are recognised when the Group becomes a party to the contractual provisions of the financial instrument and are measured initially at fair value adjusted by transactions costs, except for those carried at fair value through profit or loss, which are measured initially at fair value. Subsequent measurement of financial assets and financial liabilities are described below.

Financial assets are de-recognised when the contractual rights to the cash flows from the financial asset expire, or when the financial asset and all substantial risks and rewards are transferred.

A financial liability is de-recognised when it is extinguished, discharged, cancelled or expires.

Classification and subsequent measurement of financial assets

Except for those trade receivables that do not contain a significant financing component and are measured at the transaction price in accordance with AASB 15, all financial assets are initially measured at fair value adjusted for transaction costs (where applicable).

For the purpose of subsequent measurement, financial assets other than those designated and effective as hedging instruments are classified into the following categories upon initial recognition:

- amortised cost
- fair value through profit or loss (FVPL)
- equity instruments at fair value through other comprehensive income (FVOCI)
- debt instruments at fair value through other comprehensive income (FVOCI)

Note 3. Summary of material accounting policies (continued)

All income and expenses relating to financial assets that are recognised in profit or loss are presented within finance costs, finance income or other financial items, except for impairment of trade receivables which is presented within other expenses.

Classifications are determined by both:

- The entity's business model for managing the financial asset
- The contractual cash flow characteristics of the financial assets

All income and expenses relating to financial assets that are recognised in profit or loss are presented within finance costs, finance income or other financial items, except for impairment of trade receivables, which is presented within other expenses.

Subsequent measurement financial assets

Financial assets at amortised cost

Financial assets are measured at amortised cost if the assets meet the following conditions (and are not designated as FVPL):

- They are held within a business model whose objective is to hold the financial assets and collect its contractual cash flows.
- The contractual terms of the financial assets give rise to cash flows that are solely payments of principal and interest on the principal amount outstanding.

After initial recognition, these are measured at amortised cost using the effective interest method. Discounting is omitted where the effect of discounting is immaterial. The Group's cash and cash equivalents and trade receivables fall into this category of financial instruments as well as government bonds.

Financial assets at fair value through profit or loss (FVPL)

Financial assets that are held within a different business model other than 'hold to collect' or 'hold to collect and sell' are categorised at fair value through profit and loss. Further, irrespective of business model financial assets whose contractual cash flows are not solely payments of principal and interest are accounted for at FVPL. This includes investments.

All derivative financial instruments fall into this category, except for those designated and effective as hedging instruments, for which the hedge accounting requirements apply.

Impairment of Financial assets

AASB 9's impairment requirements use more forward-looking information to recognize expected credit losses – the 'expected credit losses (ECL) model'. Instruments within the scope included loans and other debt-type financial assets measured at amortised cost and FVOCI, trade receivables, contract assets recognised and measured under AASB 15 and loan commitments and some financial guarantee contracts (for the issuer) that are not measured at fair value through profit or loss.

The Group considers a broader range of information when assessing credit risk and measuring expected credit losses, including past events, current conditions, reasonable and supportable forecasts that affect the expected collectability of the future cash flows of the instrument. In applying this forward-looking approach, a distinction is made between:

- Financial instruments that have not deteriorated significantly in credit quality since initial recognition or that have low credit risk ('Stage 1') and
- Financial instruments that have deteriorated significantly in credit quality since initial recognition and whose credit risk is not low ('Stage 2').

'Stage 3' would cover financial assets that have objective evidence of impairment at the reporting date.

'12-month expected credit losses' are recognised for the first category while 'lifetime expected credit losses' are recognised for the second category.

Measurement of the expected credit losses is determined by a probability-weighted estimate of credit losses over the expected life of the financial instrument.

Note 3. Summary of material accounting policies (continued)

Trade and other receivables

The Group makes use of a simplified approach in accounting for trade and other receivables and records the loss allowance at the amount equal to the expected lifetime credit losses. In using this practical expedient, the Group uses its historical experience, external indicators and forward-looking information to calculate the expected credit losses using a provision matrix. The Group assess impairment of trade receivables on a collective basis as they possess credit risk characteristics based on the days past due.

Classification and measurement of financial liabilities

The Group's financial liabilities include borrowings, and trade and other payables.

Financial liabilities are initially measured at fair value, and, where applicable, transaction costs are expensed immediately through profit or loss.

Subsequently, financial liability debt instruments are measured at amortised cost using the effective interest method.

Derivatives and financial liabilities designated at FVPL, are carried subsequently at fair value with gains or losses recognised in profit or loss.

All interest-related charges and, if applicable, changes in an instrument's fair value that are reported in profit or loss are included within finance costs or finance income.

1. Equity and reserves

Share capital represents the fair value of shares that have been issued. Any transaction costs associated with the issuing of shares are deducted from share capital, net of any related income tax benefits.

Other components of equity include the following:

- Option reserve. Comprises equity settled share-based remuneration plans for the Group's employees and other share options
- Retained earnings/(Accumulated losses) include all current and prior period retained profits/(losses)
- Other contributed equity represents the shares to be issued to AGC as part of the termination of agreements with them and to be issued upon their AGC notification to Cambium Bio.

m. Employee benefits

Short-term employee benefits

Short-term employee benefits are benefits, other than termination benefits, that are expected to be settled wholly within twelve (12) months after the end of the period in which the employees render the related service. Examples of such benefits include wages and salaries, non-monetary benefits and accumulating sick leave. Short-term employee benefits are measured at the undiscounted amounts expected to be paid when the liabilities are settled.

Other long-term employee benefits

The Group's liabilities for long service leave are included in other long term benefits as they are not expected to be settled wholly within twelve (12) months after the end of the period in which the employees render the related service. They are measured at the present value of the expected future payments to be made to employees. The expected future payments incorporate anticipated future wage and salary levels, experience of employee departures and periods of service, and are discounted at rates determined by reference to market yields at the end of the reporting period on high quality corporate bonds that have maturity dates that approximate the timing of the estimated future cash outflows. Any re-measurements arising from experience adjustments and changes in assumptions are recognised in profit or loss in the periods in which the changes occur.

The Group presents employee benefit obligations as current liabilities in the statement of financial position if the Group does not have an unconditional right to defer settlement for at least twelve (12) months after the reporting period, irrespective of when the actual settlement is expected to take place.

Note 3. Summary of material accounting policies (continued)

Defined contribution plans

The Group pays fixed contributions into independent entities in relation to several state plans and insurance for individual employees. The Group has no legal or constructive obligations to pay contributions in addition to its fixed contributions, which are recognised as an expense in the period that relevant employee services are received.

n. Provisions, contingent liabilities and contingent assets

Legal disputes, make good obligations, onerous contracts or other claims are recognised when the Group has a present legal or constructive obligation as a result of a past event, it is probable that an outflow of economic resources will be required from the Group, and amounts can be estimated reliably. Timing or amount of the outflow may still be uncertain.

Provisions are measured at the estimated expenditure required to settle the present obligation, based on the most reliable evidence available at the reporting date, including the risks and uncertainties associated with the present obligation. Where there are a number of similar obligations, the likelihood that an outflow will be required in settlement is determined by considering the class of obligations as a whole. Provisions are discounted to their present values, where the time value of money is material.

Any reimbursement that the Group can be virtually certain to collect from a third party with respect to the obligation is recognised as a separate asset. However, this asset may not exceed the amount of the related provision.

No liability is recognised if an outflow of economic resources as a result of present obligation is not probable. Such situations are disclosed as contingent liabilities, unless the outflow of resources is remote in which case no liability is recognised.

o. Share-based employee remuneration

The Group operates equity settled share-based remuneration plans for its employees.

This fair value is appraised at the grant date and excludes the impact of non-market vesting conditions (for example profitability and sales growth targets and performance conditions).

All share-based remuneration is ultimately recognised as an expense in profit or loss with a corresponding credit to share option reserve. If vesting periods or other vesting conditions apply, the expense is allocated over the vesting period, based on the best available estimate of the number of share options expected to vest.

Non-market vesting conditions are included in assumptions about the number of options that are expected to become exercisable. Estimates are subsequently revised if there is any indication that the number of share options expected to vest differs from previous estimates. Any cumulative adjustment prior to vesting is recognised in the current period. No adjustment is made to any expense recognised in prior periods if share options ultimately exercised are different to that estimated on vesting.

Upon exercise of share options, the proceeds received net of any directly attributable transaction costs are allocated to share capital.

p. Revenue

For royalty revenue, and in order to determine whether to recognise revenue, the Group follows a 5-step process:

1. Identifying the contract with a customer,
2. Identifying the performance obligations,
3. Determining the transaction price,
4. Allocating the transaction price to the performance obligations,
5. Recognising revenue when/as performance obligation(s) are satisfied.

The Group will enter into licence transactions and receive upfront and milestone payments as part of research and development collaborations or out-licensing agreements.

The total transaction price for a contract is allocated amongst the various performance obligations based on their relative stand-alone selling prices using the residual method and cost method.

Note 3. Summary of material accounting policies (continued)

Revenue is recognised either at a point in time or over time, when (or as) the Group satisfies performance obligations by transferring the promised goods or services to its customers.

The Group recognises contract liabilities for consideration received in respect of unsatisfied performance obligations or where revenue is constrained and reports these amounts as contract liabilities in the statement of financial position. Similarly, if the Group satisfies a performance obligation before it receives the consideration, the Group recognises either a contract asset or a receivable in its statement of financial position, depending on whether something other than the passage of time is required before the consideration is due.

Royalty revenue is determined with reference to performance obligations to provide either patents or IP. Licence revenues are considered a right to use and recognised at a point in time, net of any revenue constraints of variable consideration. Various milestones within the agreement are considered constrained and are therefore not included in the total transaction price until the uncertainty is resolved.

Revenue relating to the provision of services is recognised when the services are provided to the extent that progress towards complete satisfaction can be reasonably measured. Progress is measured by reference to a time-based output method using the total expected time to complete the services. Progress of performance obligations, type of goods or services and significant payment terms are to be disclosed.

The assessment of the criteria for income recognition and the determination of the appropriate period during which income is recognised are subject to judgement where variable consideration that is constrained and revenue is recognised only when it is highly probable that there will not be a significant reversal of revenue.

q. Goods and services tax (GST)

Revenues, expenses and assets are recognised net of the amount of GST, except where the amount of GST incurred is not recoverable from the Australian Taxation Office. In these circumstances, the GST is recognised as part of the cost of acquisition of the asset or as part of an item of the expense. Receivables and payables in the statement of financial position are shown inclusive of GST.

Cash flows are presented in the statement of cash flows on a gross basis, except for the GST component of investing and financing activities, which are disclosed as operating cash flows.

r. Research and development

Expenditure during the research phase of a project is recognised as an expense when incurred. The research and development incentive is calculated and accrued at year end and is recognised in accordance with 'AASB 120 Accounting for Government Grants'. The amount is credited to other income and the receivable is included in the Consolidated Statement of Financial Position as a current R&D incentive receivable.

The R&D Incentive becomes receivable once the tax return is lodged which generally occurs during the first quarter after year end.

s. Operating expenses

Operating expenses are recognised in profit or loss upon utilisation of the service or at the date it is incurred.

t. Significant management judgments and estimates in applying accounting policies

The Directors evaluate estimates and judgments incorporated into the financial report based on historical knowledge and best available current information. Estimates assume a reasonable expectation of future events and are based on current trends and economic data.

When preparing the financial statements, management undertakes a number of judgments, estimates and assumptions about the recognition and measurement of assets, liabilities, income and expenses.

Estimation uncertainty

Information about estimates and assumptions that have the most significant effect on recognition and measurement of assets, liabilities, income and expense is provided below. Actual results may be substantially different.

Share options and performance rights

Share options were valued using the binomial pricing model and Black-Scholes pricing model. Historical volatility has been the basis for determining expected share price volatility as it is assumed that this is indicative of future movements. For purposes of the valuation the assumed life of the options was based on the historical exercise patterns, which may not eventuate in the future. No special features inherent to the options granted were incorporated into measurement of fair value. Where approval is required at the AGM and the service period has commenced the expense is measured from the service period start date and is re-measured at grant date (being AGM). Any true up/adjustment is reflected in future periods.

Research and development claim

In calculating the R&D incentive, the Group has treated certain research and development activities as eligible expenditure under the Australian Government tax incentive. Management has assessed these activities and expenditures undertaken in Australia and overseas to determine which are likely to be eligible under the incentive scheme. At each period end, management estimates the refundable R&D incentive available to the Group based on current information. This estimate is also reviewed by external tax advisors. For the years ended 30 June 2026 and 2025, the Group has recognised income of \$584k and \$105k respectively. Refer note 6.

Uncertainties in the estimate relate to expenditure that can be claimed under the scheme including in some cases the claimable percentages applied to certain expenditure.

Financial assets

A financial asset not carried at fair value through profit or loss is assessed at each reporting date to determine whether there is objective evidence that it is impaired. A financial asset is impaired if there is objective evidence of impairment as a result of one or more events that occurred after the initial recognition of the asset, and that the loss event(s) had an impact on the estimated future cash flows of that asset that can be estimated reliably.

Objective evidence that financial assets are impaired includes default or delinquency by a debtor, restructuring of an amount due to the Group on terms that the Group would not consider otherwise, indications that a debtor or issuer will enter bankruptcy, or the disappearance of an active market for a security. In addition, for an investment in an equity security, a material or prolonged decline in its fair value below its cost is objective evidence of impairment.

Cambium Medical Technologies, LLC (CMT) invested in Cambium Oncology LLC (CO) in 2018. CMT is a minor shareholder (less than 5%) of CO and the Company directors do not have control over CO.

During the 2026 financial year the investment had been impaired to US \$1,000. The fair value measurement has been made in accordance with AASB 9 Financial Instruments and categorised as Level 3 under the fair value hierarchy in AASB Fair Value Measurement.

Intangible asset

The Company acquired intangible assets from the acquisition of Cambium Medical Technologies, LLC (refer to note 15). The Elate Ocular intangible is an early-stage research and development asset and is a definite useful life asset which will commence amortisation once commercialisation is complete.

The recoverability of the Group's intangible assets is a key estimate. Recovery of the Elate Ocular asset is dependent on the successful completion of the Phase 3 clinical program and the subsequent commercialisation, licensing or sale of the underlying intellectual property. In assessing recoverability at 30 June 2026, the directors had regard to the regulatory progress of the program during the year, including the FDA's confirmation that a single pivotal trial can support a Biologics License Application.

Deferred tax assets

The recognition of deferred tax assets requires an estimate of the probability of future use, the influencing factors considered as part of this assessment include determination of temporary differences and budgeting/forecasting. As at the 30 June 2026 the company has not recognised deferred tax assets due to the uncertainty of the timing of ultimate recovery.

The Group's operating segment is based on the internal reports that are reviewed and used by the Board of Directors (being the Chief Operating Decision Makers (CODM)) in assessing performance and in determining the allocation of resources.

Following an assessment of the information provided to the CODM, it has been concluded that the Group operates in only one segment, being the development of innovative biologics for ophthalmology and tissue repair applications, leveraging its proprietary human platelet lysate technology.

The primary focus of this segment is the development of Elate Ocular® for dry eye disease, with additional efforts directed towards the Progenza™ platform for knee osteoarthritis and other tissue repair indications. This unified approach aligns with the Group's integrated strategy following the merger with Cambium Medical Technologies, LLC in April 2024.

Revenue for the current financial year primarily arose from royalty income related to the agreement with Zheng Yang Biomedical Technology for the manufacturing and commercialisation rights of the fibrinogen-depleted human platelet lysate (FD hPL) technology in the stem cell supplement market.

In 2014, Cambium Medical Technologies, LLC (now part of Cambium Bio) and Zheng Yang Biomedical Technology (ZYBT) entered into an agreement for the joint development of products incorporating fibrinogen-depleted human platelet lysate (FD hPL). As part of this agreement, Cambium Bio/CMT granted ZYBT worldwide manufacturing rights for the FD hPL Active Biologic Ingredient (ABI). Additionally, ZYBT was granted commercialisation rights for Elate Ocular®, the dry eye disease product, in three specific markets: China, Singapore, and Taiwan. A portion of the royalty income is payable to Emory University, which granted the exclusive right and licence to Cambium Medical Technologies, LLC. Historically, ZYBT sublicensed the manufacture and commercialisation of the FD hPL cell culture supplement to AventaCell, and the Group's royalty income was generated from AventaCell's sales of these products. In April 2026, ZYBT resumed direct manufacture and commercialisation of the cell culture supplement, and from that date the Group's royalty income is generated directly by ZYBT under the same agreement.

In 2014, Cambium Medical Technologies, LLC (now part of Cambium Bio) and Zheng Yang Biomedical Technology (ZYBT) entered into an agreement for the joint development of products incorporating fibrinogen-depleted human platelet lysate (FD hPL). As part of this agreement, Cambium Bio/CMT granted ZYBT worldwide manufacturing rights for the FD hPL Active Biologic Ingredient (ABI) for cell culture supplements and dry eye disease product categories. Additionally, ZYBT was granted commercialisation rights for Elate Ocular®, the dry eye disease product, in three specific geographic markets: China, Singapore, and Taiwan. Cambium Bio/CMT retains commercialisation rights for Elate Ocular® in all other global markets. The royalty income earned this financial year is US\$435,374 (AUD \$641,638) and the royalty amount receivable as at 30 June 2026 is US\$113,148 (AUD \$164,723). Historically, ZYBT sublicensed the manufacture and commercialisation of the FD hPL cell culture supplement to AventaCell, and the Group's royalty income was generated from AventaCell's sales of these products. In April 2026, ZYBT resumed direct manufacture and commercialisation of the cell culture supplement, and from that date the Group's royalty income is generated directly by ZYBT under the same agreement.

c. Financial risk management objective

The Group is exposed to various risks in relation to financial instruments. The main types of risks are price risk, foreign currency risk, credit risk and liquidity risk.

The Group's risk management is coordinated in close co-operation with the Board of Directors, and focuses on actively securing the Group's short to medium term cash flows by minimising the exposure to financial markets.

The Group does not actively engage in the trading of financial assets for speculative purposes. The most significant financial risks to which the Group is exposed are described below.

d. Foreign exchange risk

Foreign exchange risk is the risk of an adverse impact on the Group's financial performance as a result of exchange rate volatility.

Foreign exchange risk arises when future commercial transactions and recognised assets and liabilities are denominated in a currency that is not the entity's functional currency.

The Group is exposed to foreign exchange risk arising primarily from transactions with foreign consultants and suppliers and revenue from royalty arrangements. Material exposure to currency risk arises from foreign currency transactions and is limited to trade. The total AUD balance of trade payables denominated in a foreign currency (USD & EUR) at 30 June 2026 is \$884,667 (2025: \$688,055).

Management have assessed the risk of movement in interest rates, and foreign exchange and believe the nature of the net risk is minimal and do not believe the impact would be material to the accounts.

f. Credit risk

Credit risk refers to the risk that a counter party will default on its contractual obligations resulting in a financial loss to the Group.

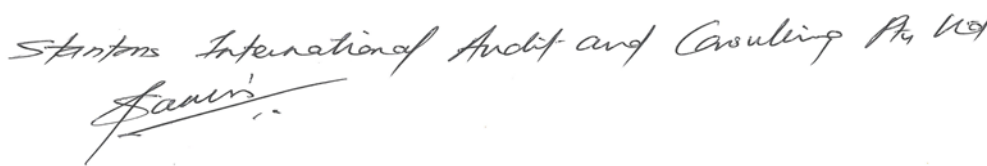
